The jewelry consisted of a fourteen carat yellow gold tennis bracelet, .85 carat solitaire ring. yellow gold coin ring and fourteen carat ring with 8 two point diamonds and 7 ten point diamonds.

Some of the items were pawned at West Side Pawn for \$1000 by the man who purchased them.

During the investigation, it was learned Christopher Cox and Ashley Robinson had been hired to clean a condo located on Meadow Walk Lane in Lenoir City on July 22, 2009. The owner, Mr. Greg West hired a contractor to clean the condo, who then hired Mr. Cox and Ms. Robinson.

Mr. West discovered someone had taken jewelry belonging to him and his wife, Amy West, from the condo.

Mr. West spoke to the couple who bought and pawned some of the jewelry they stated they had purchased the jewelry and showed a Tag Heuer watch and ring to Mr. West that had not been pawned. Mr. West identified the jewelry as having come from the condo.

Robinson also was charged with theft over \$10,000.

or improve conditions for human activities while protecting the natural environment.

"The StopLitterTM message reflects Tennesseans' frustration with litter in our communities, and it has been extremely effective," said TDOT Commissioner Gerald Nicely. "This award recognizes the hard work of numerous employees who helped make this campaign a success."

The StopLitterTM campaign, which was launched by First Lady Andrea Conte in 2006, was the first new, comprehensive litter prevention initiative since the 1970's

Tennessee Trash Campaign. The EHEI award recognizes TDOT in the Education and Training Programs category for developing an innovative, multi-faceted campaign to reduce roadside litter.

"Education is one of the strongest weapons in battling litter," said TDOT Beautification Coordinator Shawn Bible. "This campaign has heightened awareness of the problem across the state and the negative impact litter has on our environment."

TDOT estimates it will spend \$6 million for litter removal by its maintenance forces and paid contractors.

An additional \$5 million in annual funds. collected through a tax on the soft drink and malt beverage industry, is used across the state to assist local communities

with litter collection and litter prevention education. In addition, 3,850 volunteers donate their time to picking up litter from approximately 770 miles of state-owned

roadsides through TDOT's Adopt-A-Highway program.





low-interest loans for water and waste-water infrastructure improvements. The funding comes from a combination of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 and the State Revolving Fund Loan Program. Forty percent of the funding is

in the form of principal forgiveness, which does not have to be regaid.

This is the second round of Recovery Act grants and loans to be approved under the State Revolving Fund

"The Recovery Act is helping critical drinking water and wastewater infrastructure improvements in Tennessee move forward, which benefits both public health and the environment," said Bredesen. "The principal forgiveness provision of the Recovery Act is an important aspect of the program, allowing us to provide additional relief to local communities during difficult economic

The low-interest loans and principal forgiveness are used to finance the planning, design and construction of water and wastewater facilities. Through this program, communities, utility districts and water and wastewater authorities can obtain loans with lower interest rates than most can obtain through private financing. Interest rates for the loans can vary from zero percent to market rate based on each community's

economic index.

"I am always pleased to see local governments and utility districts access this program to help finance the planning, design and construction of water and wastewater facilities," said Fyke. "Investments in our drinking water and wastewater systems are vital to the health of our communities, and we look forward to

working with communities to move forward with these important projects."

For the calendar year 2009, EPA provided almost \$77 million in Recovery Act funding for the State Revolving Fund Loan Program and the state was not required to provide matching funds. In order to extend Recovery Act funding to a larger group of projects, Tennessee combined it with an equal amount of funding from the existing State Revolving Fund, which by law, cannot be used for another

purpose.
The funding order of projects is determined by the SRF Loan Program's Priority Ranking Lists that rank potential projects according to the severity of their pollution and/or compliance problems or for the protection of public health. Environment and Conservation administers the Recovery Act/State Revolving Fund Loan Program in conjunction with the Tennessee Local Development Authority.

Wastewater loans were announced for the seven recipients,

which included:
City of Lenoir City
(Loudon County)
– Lenoir City will receive \$4.5 million for wastewater treatment plant improvements and upgrades. The project includes digester rehabilitation to capture methane gas and convert it to energy for use in running the plant's boiler/heat exchanger, trickling filter rehabilitation and miscellaneous upgrades. The project will be funded with a 20-year, \$2.7 million loan with an interest rate of 2.88 percent and \$1.8 million in principal forgiveness that will not have to be repaid.

City of Madisonville (Monroe County) – Madisonville will receive \$5.83 million to convert the existing 900,000 gallon-per-

day wastewater treatment plant to a 1.5 million gallon-per-day equalization basin and pump station, construct approximately 8.3 miles of force main to transport screened wastewater to the Tellico Reservoir Development Agency's wastewater treatment plant, and eliminate Madisonville's wastewater treatment plant discharge to Bat Creek. The project will be funded with a 20-year, \$3.5 million loan with an interest rate of 2.14 percent and \$2.33 million in principal forgiveness that will not have to be repaid.

This is the second round of Recovery Act grants/loans to be approved under the State Revolving Fund Program. The previously announced projects can be found at http://news.tennesseeany-time.org/node/2342. Additional Recovery Act/State Revolving Fund loans including principal forgiveness will be announced as they are finalized.

Since its inception in 1987, Tennessee's Clean Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program has awarded more than \$1 billion in low-interest loans. Since its inception in 1996, Tennessee's Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Loan Program has awarded more than \$137 million in low-interest loans. Both programs combined award approximately \$75 million annually to Tennessee's local governments for water and wastewater infrastructure projects.


