a ceremony at the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia on June 7, 2017. The brick represents the academy's culminating physical achievement, a storied and grueling 10-kilometer obstacle course called the Yellow Brick Road.

The inclusion of international students dates back to the academy's beginnings but expanded in earnest in the early 1960s, when President Kennedy signed National Security Action Memorandum No. 177 to enhance the training of overseas officers in the United States. To date, from 171 students countries have gone
