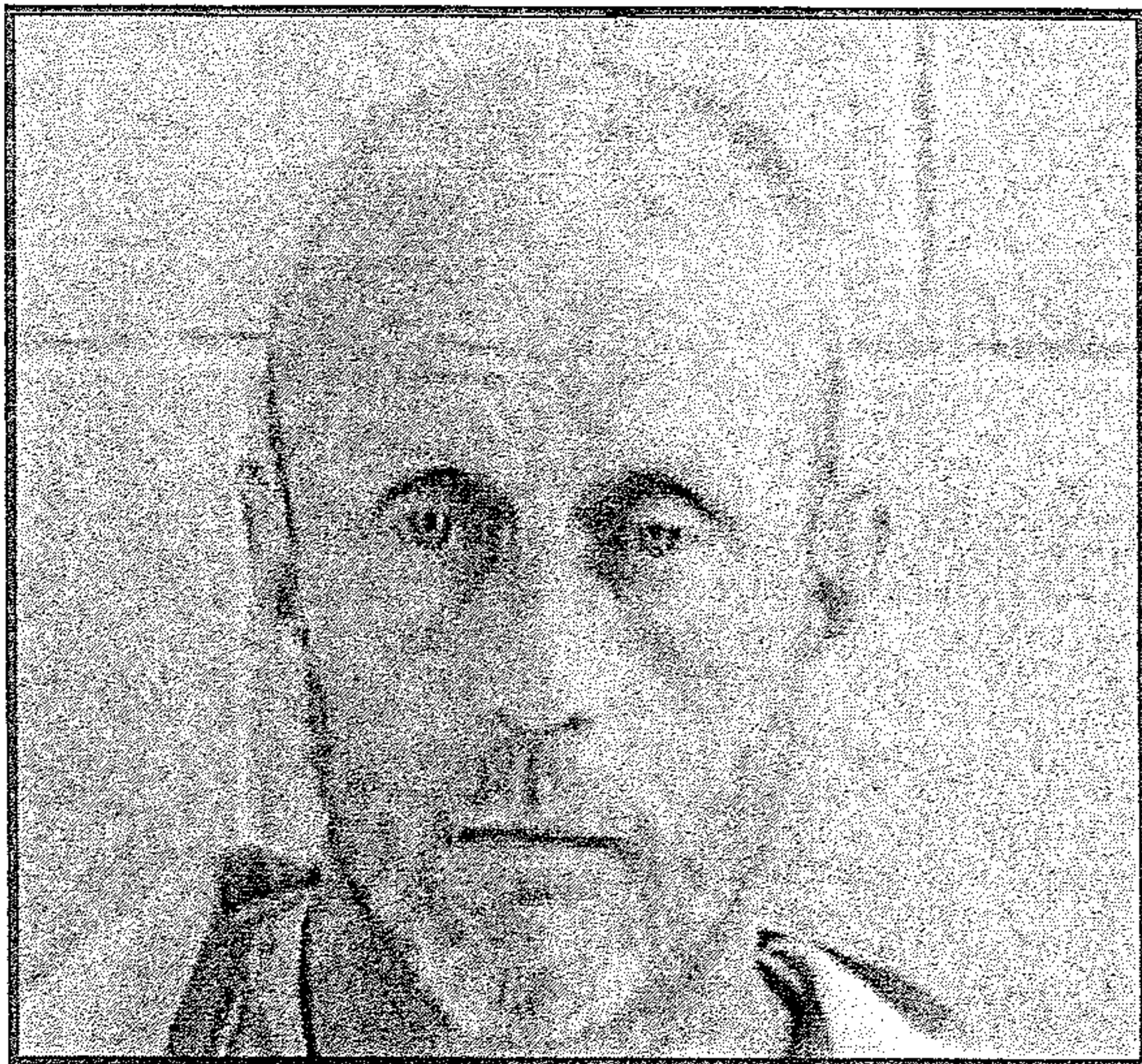

Comptroller's Office Reviews TBI's Fiscal Operations and Makes Recommendations

The Tennessee Comptroller's Office has released a special report examining several aspects of the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation's fiscal operations, including an analysis of TBI's budget, the procurement of its Pilatus airplane, staffing, and grants and contracts.

The special report was initiated after Senator Bo Watson (R-Hixson) called for an examination of TBI's budgeting and accounting practices.

Director Addresses Cyber Conference 'Raising Our Game' to Stay Head of Cyber Threats

FBI Director Christopher Wray speaks at the International Conference on Cyber Security at Fordham University in New York City on January 9, 2018.

As the threats from hackers and other cyber criminals grow, the FBI is committed to developing its workforce's cyber expertise,

building partnerships, and punishing cyber criminals who target the United States, FBI Director Christopher Wray said at a major cyber security conference this week.

"Today, we live much of our lives online, and we're in a situation where just about everything that is important to us

Cyber

lives on the Internet. And that's a pretty scary thought for a lot of people," Director Wray said. "What was once a minor threat—people hacking for fun or bragging rights—has now turned into full-blown nation-state economic espionage and very, very lucrative cyber criminal activity. The threat is now coming at us from all sides."

Sponsored by the FBI and Fordham University, the International Conference on Cyber Security featured expert speakers—including several FBI officials—on a wide variety of cyber-related topics, ranging from botnets and malware to disinformation campaigns and attacks on critical infrastructure. Wray was joined in the conference's opening ceremony the Rev. Joseph McShane, president of Fordham University; William Baker, of Fordham's Bernard L. Schwartz Center for Media, Public Policy, and Education; and FBI New York Assistant Director in Charge William F. Sweeney, Jr.

Wray said there are numerous different types of cyber threats facing the country—nation-state intrusions, hacktivists, insider threats, and, more recently, the so-called "blended threat" of nation-states using criminal hackers to work for them.

The Bureau is developing the cyber skills of its workforce

and organizing its personnel to work the threat most effectively. For example, the FBI's Cyber Action Teams can deploy at a moment's notice, much the way counterterrorism teams respond to an attack or threat. Additionally, Cyber Task Forces in every FBI field office respond to breaches, conduct investigations, and collect actionable intelligence. The FBI is also strategically embedding cyber agents with international partners to build relationships and coordinate investigations.

Wray cited recent cyber successes, including the international effort to take down Darknet marketplaces AlphaBay and Hansa Market, as well as identifying and bringing indictments against four hackers who stole information on millions on Yahoo! users.

Partnerships are key to the FBI's success in its cyber efforts, and the Bureau is always working to develop collaborative relationships with both law enforcement and the private sector. Wray encouraged the private sector to keep the lines of communication open, especially in the event of a breach of their systems.

"While we may not be able to stop all threats before they begin, we can do a lot more in the early stages, at the beginning, to stop threats before they get worse. We can share information. We can identify signatures. We can stop sim-

ilar attacks from happening elsewhere," Wray said. "But to do that, we need the private sector to work with us."

Once hackers or other cyber adversaries are identified, the FBI and partner agencies work to impose some cost on them—even if they are not in the United States to be arrested and tried in the American justice system. Sometimes the best approach is "naming and shaming"—unsealing indictments and letting cyber criminals know that they are fugitives wanted by the FBI—or seeking sanctions from the Treasury Department.

Wray described the "urgency of the task we all face" and said all parties involved in cyber security need to "raise our game" as the threats grow. He specifically cited the "Going Dark" problem—in which the FBI and other law enforcement agencies cannot access devices lawfully allowed to be accessed with appropriate technical tools—as a critical issue that the private and public sectors must work collaboratively to solve to

preserve public safety.

"Whether we're in law enforcement, the government, private sector, technology industry, the security field, and academia—we're going to need to figure out a way to work together and stay ahead of the threat and to adapt to changing technologies and their consequences, both the

expected ones and the unexpected ones," Wray said. "Because at the end of the day, we all want the same thing—which is to protect our systems, protect our innovation, and above all, to protect our people."

DUI

Donald Thomason, 42, ShawFerry Road Lenoir City, was charged with DUI. Officer C Morgan LCPD, was dispatched to Hwy 321 N for a possible drunk driver passed out in his vehicle. Upon arrival the vehicle pulled out onto Hwy 321 Officer initiated his lights and sirens and the driver refused to stop continuing onto I75. The driver finally came to a stop at mile marker 78. Upon contact with the driver Donald Thomason, Officer could smell a strong odor of alcohol and noticed 4 Bud Lights in the passenger floor board. Officer conducted field sobriety test, which Thomason did poorly on. Thomason agreed to blood draw once at the ER Thomason became angry when he found out he had to wait on a kit to arrive.

Thomason then refused blood draw and was transported to the Loudon Jail.

Report

The General Assembly included language within the 2017 Appropriations Act requiring the review to be complete by January 31, 2018.

The Comptroller's Office found TBI's expenditures have exceeded its budgeted estimates since 2014, and TBI has relied on its various reserve funds for its continued operations. These accounts have been greatly diminished as TBI has used these funds. The Comptroller's Office concluded that TBI and the Department of Finance and Administration should commit to improve communication during the budget process.

The review also includes an examination of the procurement of TBI's Pilatus Airplane. The Comptroller's Office found that, although policies were followed, the procurement could have been more cost-effective.

Additionally, the Comptroller's Office researched the history of TBI and performed an analysis of TBI's independence. TBI is an operationally independent cabinet-level agency that does not clearly belong to a single branch of government. TBI's unique role in state government requires a balance between independence and accountability.

Comptroller Justin P. Wilson will present the results of the TBI Special Report to the Senate Finance, Ways and Means Committee on January 16, 2018

at 11:00 a.m.

The Comptroller's Office has also released TBI's performance audit report which found TBI's policies surrounding the use of its aircraft were not sufficient, a failure to collect all sex offender registration fees, and the Drug Offender Registry was not always accurate or up to date.

The Comptroller's Office will present the TBI performance audit to the Judiciary and Government Joint Subcommittee of Government Operations on January 25, 2018 at 10:00 a.m.

Brandon Welda, 26, Sweetwater Road Sweetwater, was charged with Driving on Revoked/Suspended License, Evading Arrest, Reckless Driving, Reckless Endangerment, and Speeding 21 MPH Over Limit.

According to the report, Deputy R Partin LCSO, observed a gray vehicle traveling Northbound on Hwy 11. The vehicle then turned onto Spring Street and accelerated at a speed faster than the posted limit.

Upon attempting to pace the vehicle to confirm speed the vehicle then began to accelerate at a higher rate of speed. Deputy then activated his emer-
