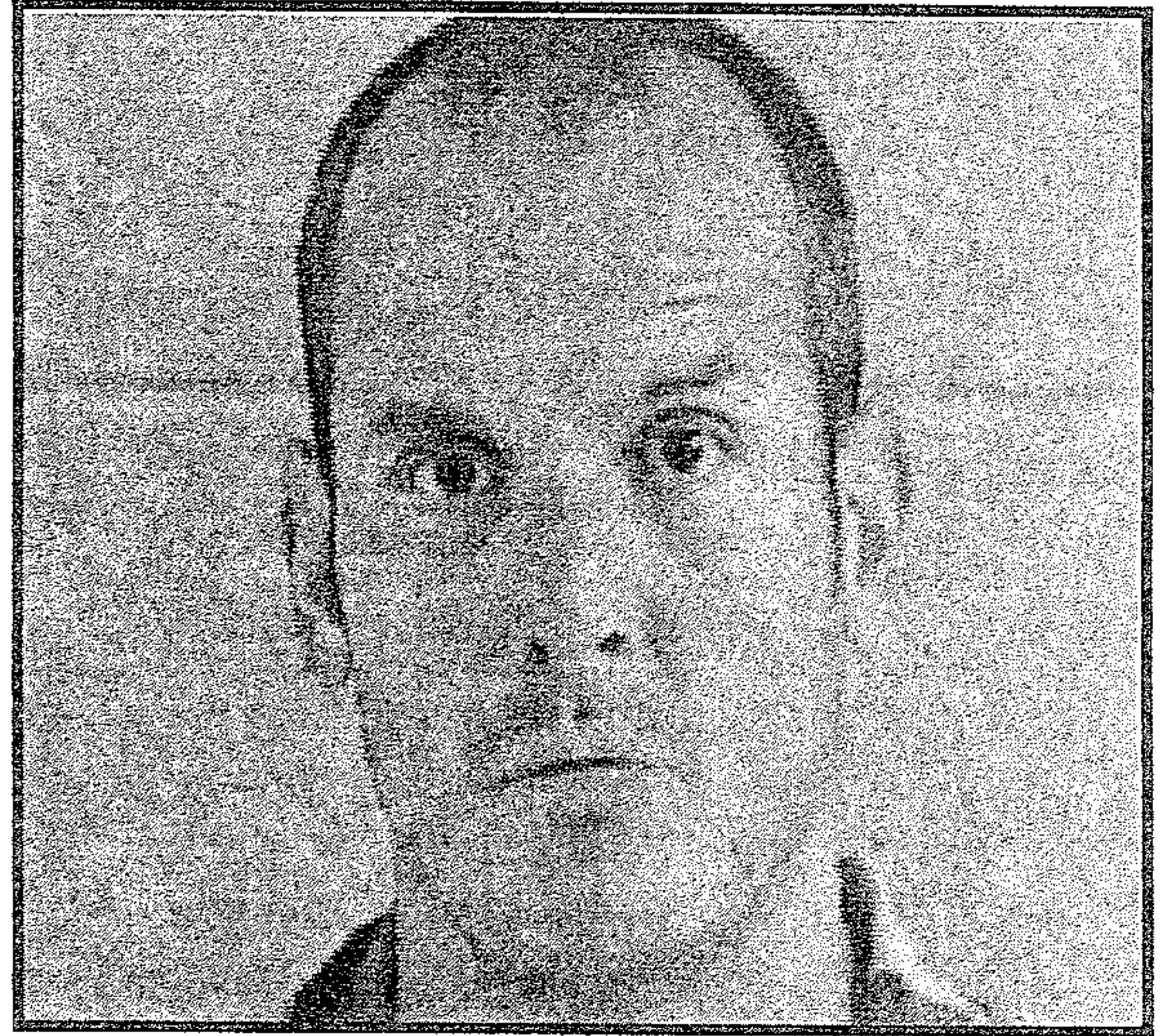

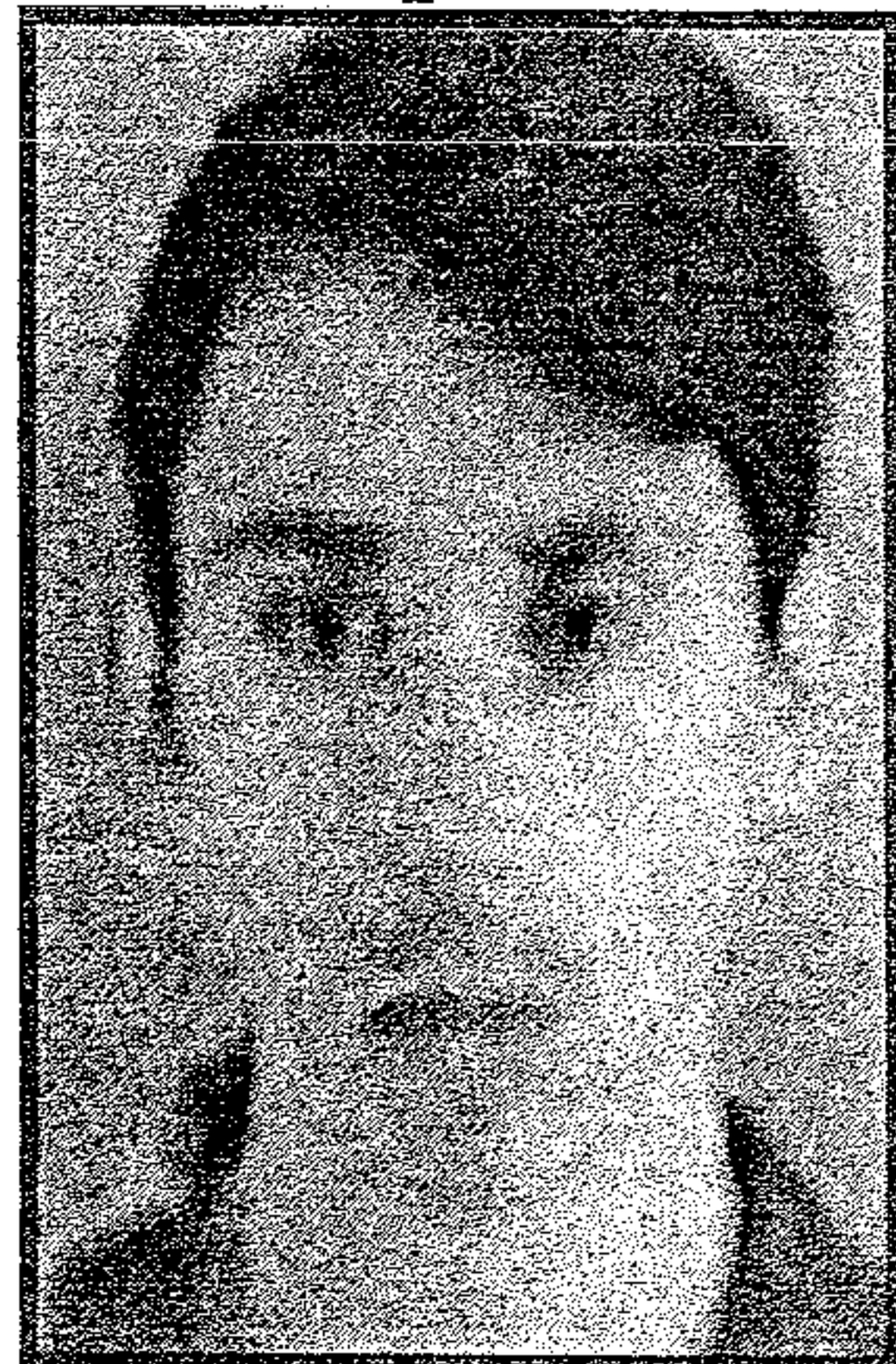
The Tennessee Celebration of International Human Rights Day will take place in Nashville at the First Amendment Center on December 11, 2018.

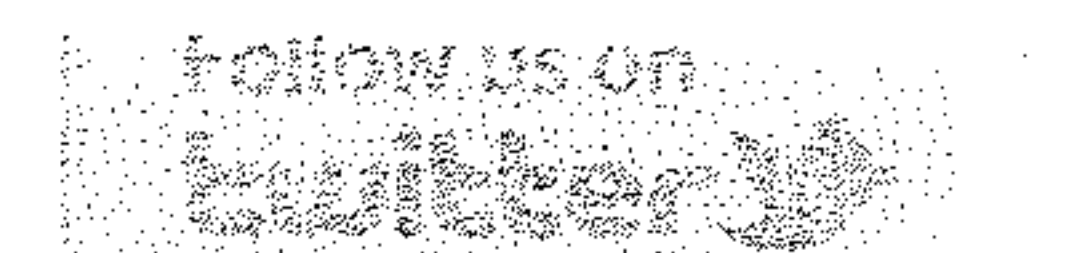

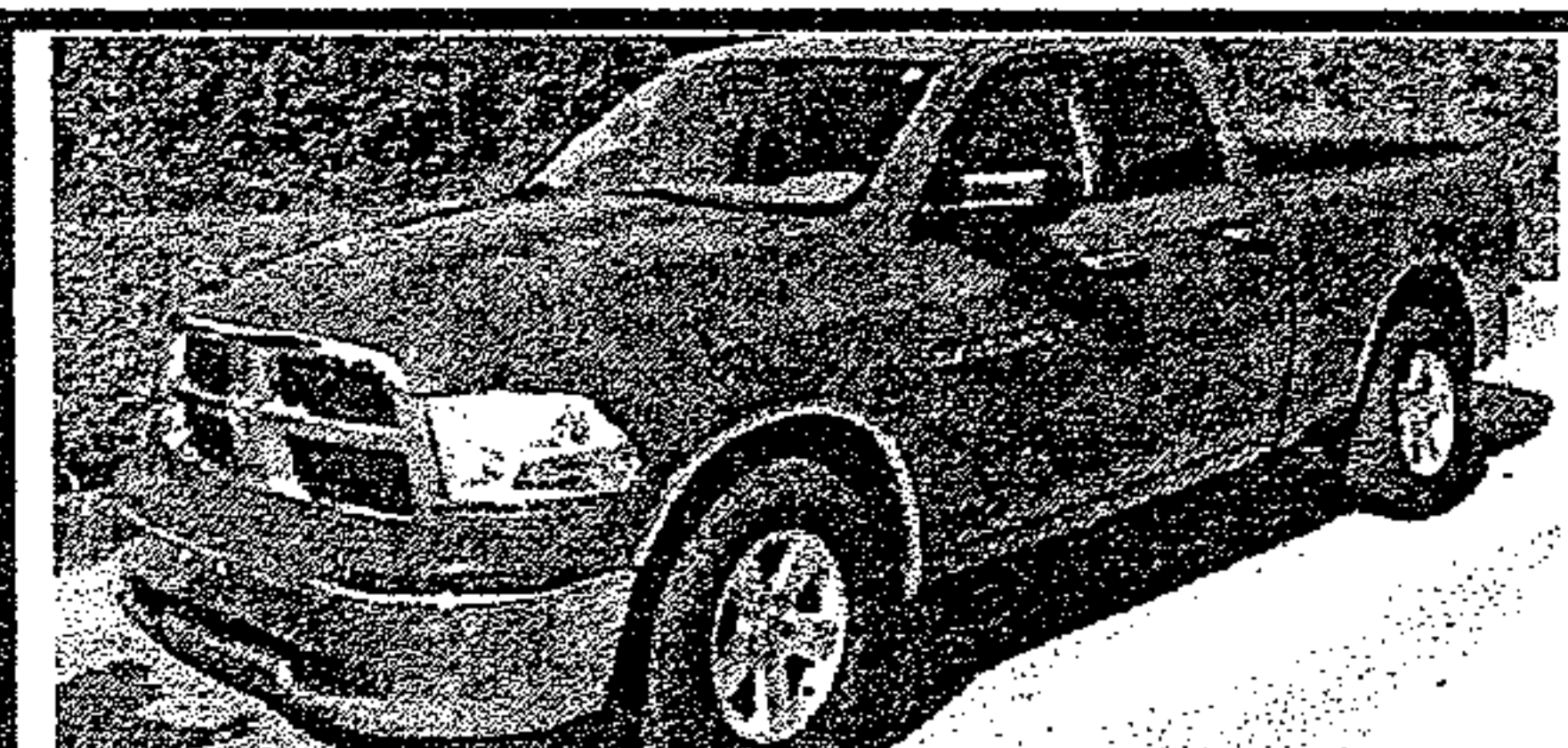

19 9mm pistol, an empty 22lr derringer, marijuana pipe, rolling papers, a revoked DL., no insurance, numerous empty beer cans, and several unopen beer cans still cold to the touch. A search warrant was obtained for Oliver blood and a sample

was taken at UT Medical Center. Oliver was then transported to the Loudon Jail.

Church

Michael Hanlon, 40, Abbott Road Lenoir City, was charged with Resisting Arrest. Deputy Charles Huskins LCSO,

was dispatched to a possible verbal harassment call at the Church of God on Shaw Ferry Road. When Deputy arrived on scene he made contact with the complainant who stated that he walked out of the fellowship hall and stated that a subject dressed in all black with a jump rope in his hand and started yelling Jihad, Allah is God and he was going to blow up the church by next week and kill all the people in it. Subject was identified as Michael Hanlon, who tried to get complainant to fight him. Complainant called for help. Deputy made contact with Michael at Bimbo's, and as Deputy approached him Deputy ask if he had any weapons on him and he ask if he was being detained, Deputy stated not at this time. Michael then started telling Deputy he new his rights and that he was leaving. Deputy told Michael that he needed to talk to him, Michael stated that the people at the church called him a Jew and kike and he did try to talk to them. Deputy felt positive at that moment that positive ID was made. Michael walked away from Deputy while he was speaking with him. Deputy told him to stop. Michael would not stop, Deputy and 2 LCPD Officer did get Michael stopped about eighty yards away from where Deputy was speaking with him. Michael Hanlon was placed under arrest.

Assault

Daniel Woods, 21, Kelly Lane Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Assault. Daniel Woods did commit the offence of aggravated assault. Woods assaulted the victim at their apt. on Kelly Lane. rates the ratification of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights by the United Nations on Dec 10, 1948. This year is the 70th anniversary of this important historical document.

During the event, leaders are acknowledged, and awards will go to human rights champions in three categories: Rising Advocate, Outstanding Service and Lifetime Achievement. Past recipients of these prestigious honors can be seen at NashvilleHumanRights.org.

A committee of human rights organizations and nonprofits, including the Tennessee Human Rights Commission, Metro Human Relations Commission, United Nations Association, UNICEF, Amnesty International, Tennessee United for Human Rights, the Church

of Scientology, and others, work together each year to plan the event.

For the 2018 event, four Rising Advocate Awards will be given to those who have made great strides for human rights and show even greater promise for the future. They are Anne Barnett & Odessa Kelly, both with STAND UP Nashville, who were instrumental in making sure the "Do Better Bill" passed earlier this year; Fayo Abadula who co-founded Oromo Youth of Nashville, a mentorship group for the Oromo youth and anyone from the African Diaspora interested in pursuing a college degree; and the Community Oversight Now coalition which recently successfully got Amendment 1 passed which will create a Community Oversight

The indictment was recently unsealed by the U.S. District Court and has not yet been set for trial. The case will be heard by the Honorable J. Ronnie Greer, Senior U.S. District Judge.

The indictment, on file with U.S. District Court, alleges that each of these individuals was involved in a conspiracy to distribute 50 grams or more of meth in the Eastern District of Tennessee and elsewhere. Moreno-Pantiga, Maldonado-Pa-

tino, Fields, Arnold, Jeffrey Isley, McIntosh, Church, Broyles, Earley, Brian Gray, Austin Isley, Chelsea Gray, Makayla Isley, Johnson, Maples, and Davis were also each charged with at least one count of possession of a firearm in furtherance of a drug trafficking crime. The indictment also alleges other charges related to the distribution and possession with the intent to distribute controlled substances as well as money laundering.

If convicted of the meth conspiracy charge, each faces a minimum mandatory term of at least 10 years and up to life in prison, at least five years of supervised release, a fine of up to \$10,000,000, any applicable forfeiture, and a \$100 special assessment. Moreno-Pantiga, Maldonado-Pa-

nold, Jeffrey Isley, McIntosh, Church, Broyles, Earley, Brian Gray, Austin Isley, Chelsea Gray, Makayla Isley, Johnson, Maples, and Davis face a minimum mandatory term of at least five years and up to life in prison for the firearms charges against them, which must be served consecutively to any other prison term imposed, up to five years supervised release, a fine of up to \$250,000, and a \$100 special assessment.

The ongoing investigation leading to the indictment was the product of a partnership between Greene County Sheriff's Department, Greenville Police Department, Hawkins County Sheriff's Department, Hamblen County Sheriff's Department, Jefferson County Sheriff's Department, Washington County Sheriff's Department, Tusculum Police Department, Baileyton Police Department, Elizabethton Police Department, Third Judicial Drug Task Force, Fourth Judicial Drug Task Force, Tennessee Bureau of Investigation, Tennessee National Guard Counterdrug Task Force, Tennessee Highway Patrol, United States Marshal Service, Homeland Securi-

ty Investigations, Drug Enforcement Administration, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and FBI. Assistant U.S. Attorney J. Christian Lampe will represent the United States.

Members of the public are reminded that an indictment constitutes only charges and that every person is presumed innocent until his or her guilt has been proven beyond a reasonable doubt.

The investigation is a result of the Department of Justice's Organized Crime and Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) program, the centerpiece of the Department of Justice's drug supply reduction strategy. OCDETF was established in 1982 to conduct comprehensive, multi-level attacks on major drug trafficking and money laundering organizations. Today, OCDETF combines the resources and expertise of its member federal agencies in cooperation with state and local law enforcement. The principal mission of the OCDETF program is to identify, disrupt, and dismantle the most serious drug trafficking and money laundering organizations and those primarily responsible for the nation's drug supply.

This case is also part of Project Safe Neighborhoods (PSN), a program bringing together all levels of law enforcement and the communities they serve to reduce violent crime and make our neighborhoods safer for everyone. Former Attorney General Jeff Sessions reinvigorated PSN in 2017 as part of the Department's renewed focus on targeting violent criminals, directing all U.S. Attorney's Offices to work in partnership with federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement and the local community to develop effective, locally-based strategies to reduce violent crime.

Board for the police in Nashville, and has advocated for social justice and civil rights.
