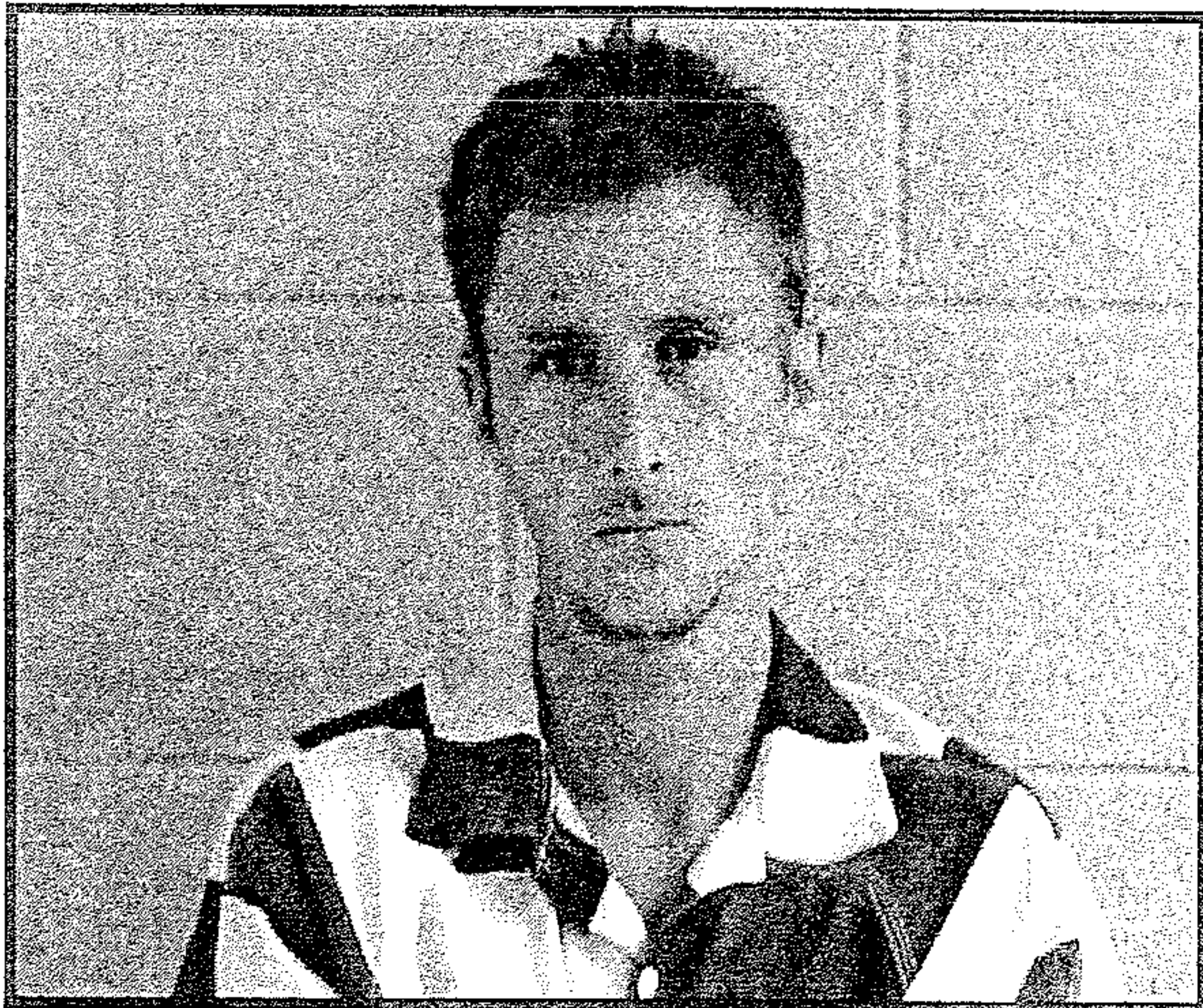

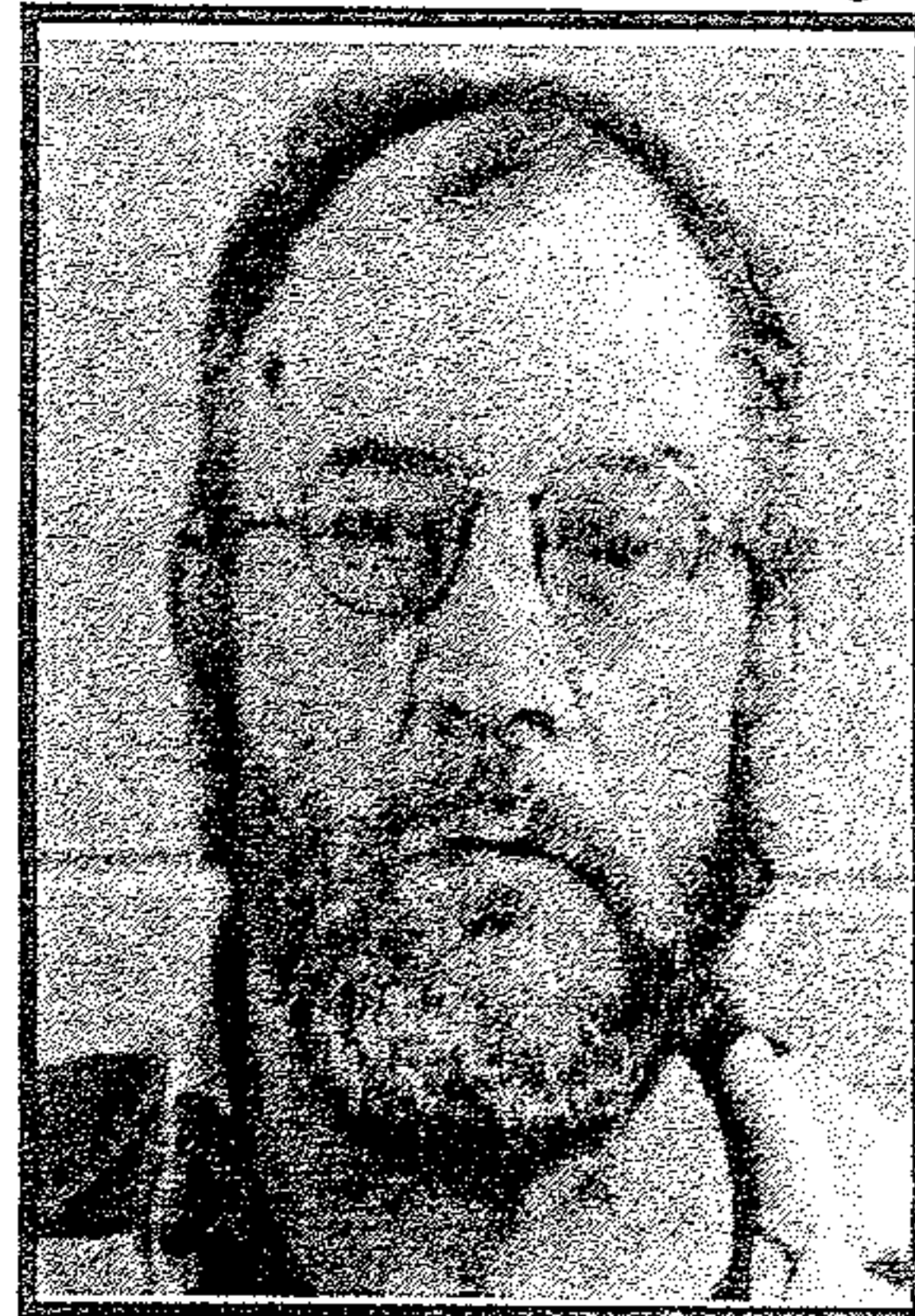

Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted

FBI Releases Police Line-of-Duty Death Statistics for 2017

A total of 93 officers were killed in the line of duty last year, according to a portion of the FBI's Law Enforcement Officers Killed and Assaulted, 2017 (LEOKA) report released today.

Of these deaths, 46 were felonious and 47 were accidental.

Both numbers have decreased from 2016, during which 66 officers were feloniously killed and 52 were accidentally killed, for a total of 118 line-of-duty deaths.

The FBI collects data on officer assaults and deaths from local, state, tribal, campus,

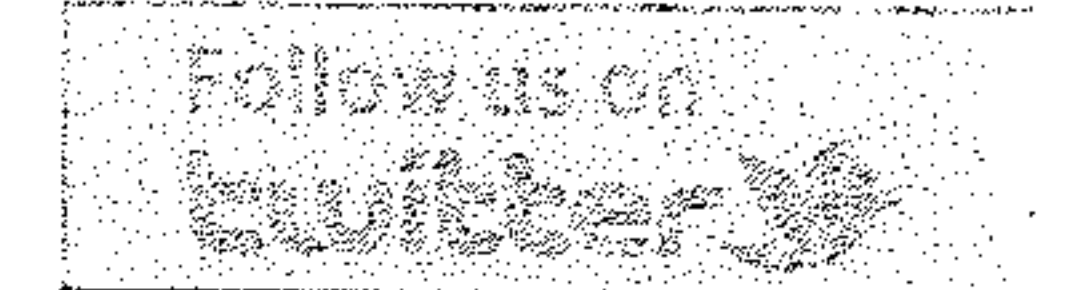



Also to Chief Jimmy Davis for all he has done for me and never giving up on me. He even came to my moms funeral, which meant a lot. My addiction started at age 14. It got worse, and I hit rock bottom. I was a full blown addict at 14. My addiction made me do some terrible things. I've been arrested 37 times. I'm glad to be on the front page now, today, sharing my story on life after drugs. I've overdosed 4 times. God must've known I'd help people one day! I put my family through pure Hell! The disease is so powerful. Addiction is so hard to beat. You must change all people, places, and things. I've lost so many friends to the disease that I have. It's all in how you feed that addiction. I joined Loudon County Drug Coalition Team. This community must come together and help the sick and suffering addicts. We meet every other Thursday at 6th Avenue Church at 6:30pm. We'd love to have all y'all there. If you are sick and suffering, you can change that.

Before I chose to get clean. I isolated and didn't wanna go anywhere. I love my family but getting "high" was more important than going out to movies, family getaways, etc. Thank you to my husband, Danny Langley, for always being there and giving me accountability that no one has ever given to me. Get in church and anyone can do this if I can! I will

spend the rest of my life beating this disease, but it's either I choose Life, or Death! I choose Life! One of any drugs is too many, and one more is Never enough. Always keep the disease of addiction (the Devil) the sick and suffering in your prayers. Some people may look at overdoses as, "well, they shouldn't have done the drugs" etc., but until you have walked a mile in an addicts or ones families shoes, don't judge. Pray and let's come together as a community and beat this Epidemic!

Today, I enjoy family outings, coffee and cigarettes instead of Drugs! Just so proud of how I am now. My momma sure would be proud of me. I've been on probation for 5 1/2 years. I get off in December. I am almost there.

Most people reading this know me or have heard of me I'm sure. If I can do this, so can you! I own a home. I have custody of three children. 

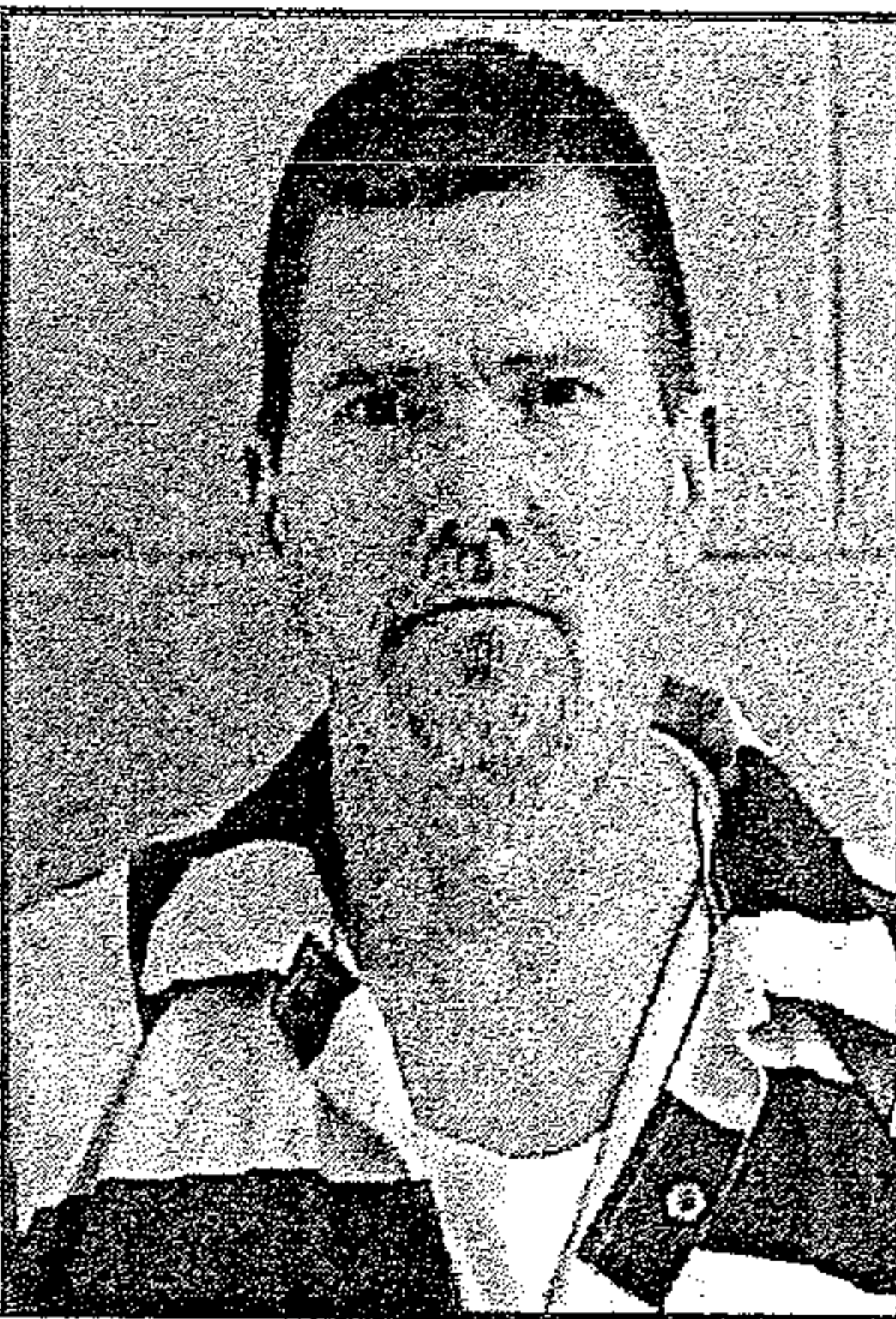

and federal law enforcement agencies from around the country, as well as organizations that track officer deaths. The Bureau publishes the data annually through its Uniform Crime Reporting Program, and the national-level statistics can be used to help create data-driven safety training for officers.

Among the officers who were feloniously killed: The average age was 38 years old, with an average tenure of 11 years in law enforcement. Forty-three of the officers were men, and three were women. Most of the officers (42) were killed by firearms, three were killed by vehicles (used as weapons), and one officer was killed with a knife.

Among the officers who were accidentally killed: The average age was 40 years old, with an average tenure of 12 years in law enforcement. Forty-five were men, and two were women. The most common accidental deaths were automobile accidents (29), being struck by vehicles (six), or motorcycle/ATV

accidents (five).

To provide more timely data to the public, the FBI released portions of its annual LEOKA publication today, instead of in the fall as we have in past years. The remaining portions of the publication, featuring data on officer assaults in the line of duty for 2017, will be released later this year.

As a result of a recent technical refresh, the database containing LEOKA information can process more data than ever before, which means the FBI can now share additional details about incidents in which law enforcement officers are killed and assaulted in the line of duty.
