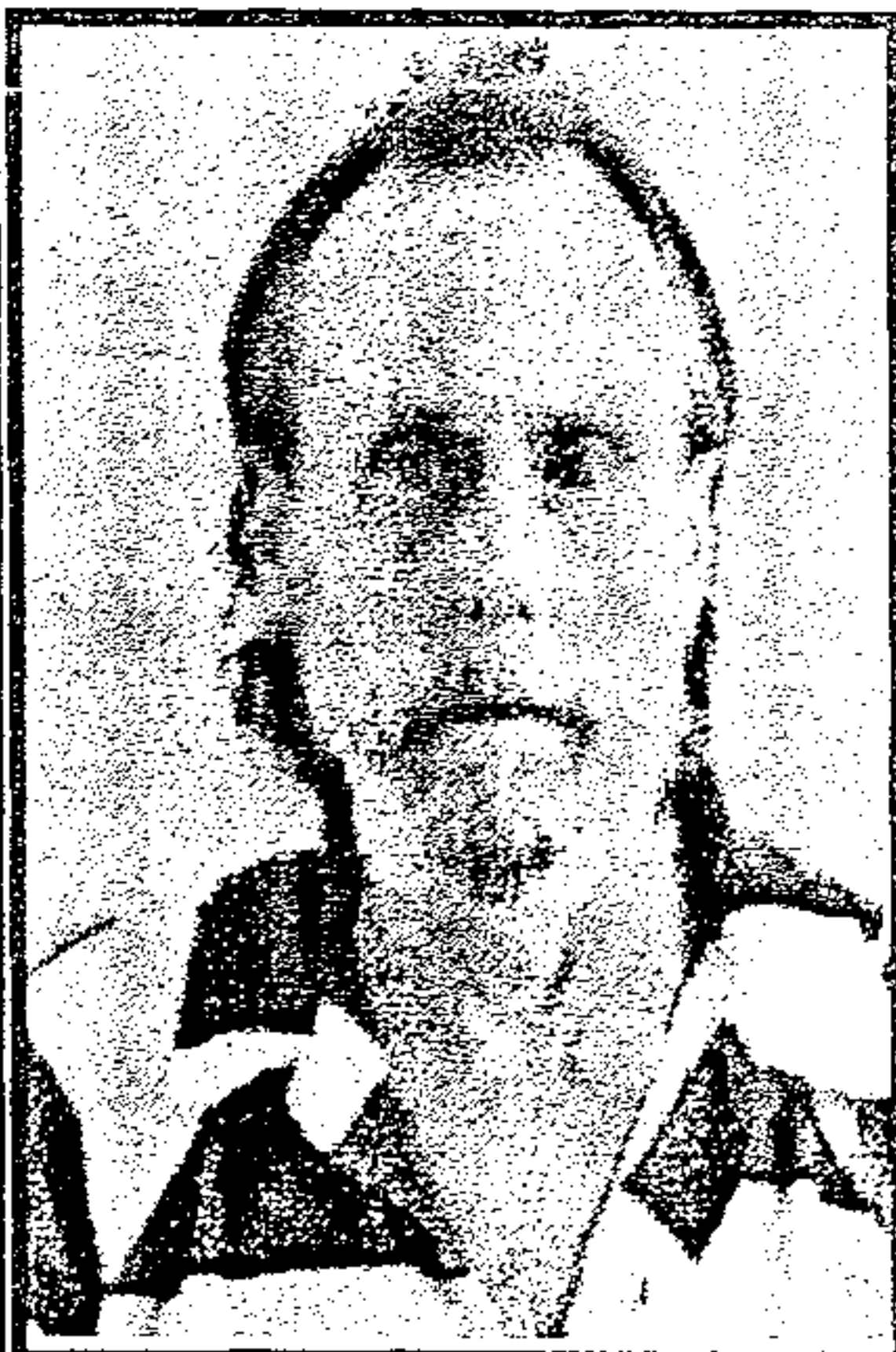

Think Before You Post

Hoax Threats are Serious Federal Crimes

In the aftermath of tragic shootings, such as the recent ones at Santa Fe High School in Texas and Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Florida, there is often an increase in hoax threats to schools and other public places. Safety is paramount, and the FBI and our state and local law enforcement

partners always respond to each threat.

In recent months, the FBI and law enforcement around the country have investigated a number of hoax threats of targeted violence against schools and other public places. These threats—often issued via text message or posted on social media—are taken

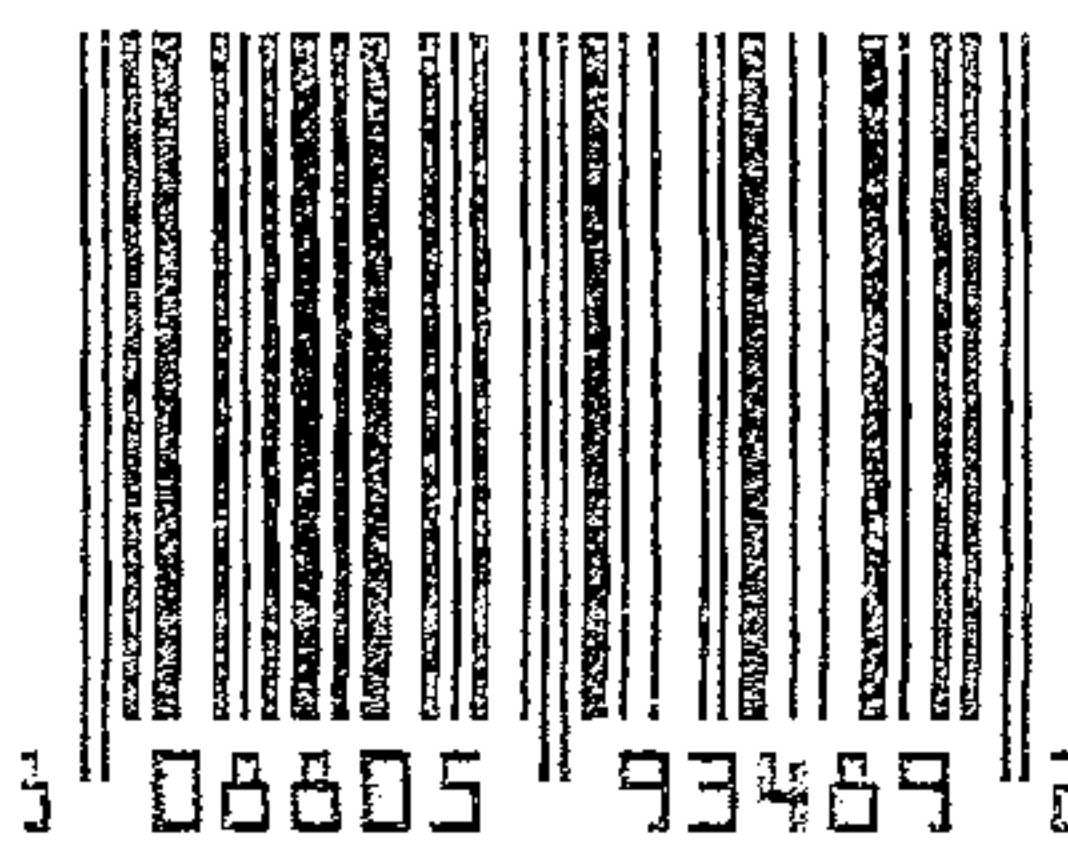



DUI

Luke Patterson, 28, Renford Road Knoxville, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Deputy Pesterfield LCSO, witnessed a red Honda traveling on Highway 70 East toward Highway 11. The vehicle upon approach of Deputy had it's high beams activated and did not turn them off. The vehicle was weaving toward the middle of the roadway. Deputy performed a traffic stop on the vehicle on Highway 11 at Watt Rd. Upon contact with the driver Deputy identified him as Mr. Luke Patterson. Upon contact with Mr. Patterson Deputy noticed he had slowed speech, blood shot watery eyes, and dilated pupils.

Deputy asked Mr. Patterson where he was headed to which he stated he was going for a drive to turkey creek in Knoxville. Mr. Patterson seemed very confused and drowsy. Deputy asked Mr. Patterson where he lived to which he stated "Nashville" Mr. Patterson's DL showed he lived in Knoxville. Mr. Patterson could not tell him where he was coming from. Deputy asked Mr. Patterson to step out of the vehicle to which he did. Deputy asked Mr. Patterson what he had taken tonight to which he stated he took Gabapentin about an hour before he stopped him. Mr. Patterson then did perform field sobriety poorly. Mr. Patterson could not follow instructions and could not focus on the task Deputy asked him to. Deputy read Mr. Patterson his rights and

asked him what would be in his blood to which he stated Gabapentin and a sleep medication. Deputy asked when he took the sleep medication to which he seemed confused and then said 4 years ago. Deputy read Mr. Patterson the implied consent form to which he refused to submit to a blood draw. Mr. Patterson was placed in custody and transported to the Loudon County Jail. Deputy is charging Mr. Patterson with driving under the influence and violation of implied consent. Mr. Patterson was issued a citation (#15624) for bright lights. All the above actions did occur in Loudon County TN.

Mark Goedeke, 54, Echo Hollow Road Lenoir City, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. VI., Poss. of Drug Para., and Unlawful Carry or Possession of a Weapon. Loudon County Sheriff Narcotic Unit, assisted with the Loudon County Sheriff K9 Unit conducted a search warrant at the residence of Mark Goedeke located at Echo Hollow Road. Approximately 329.3 grams of marijuana, 3 sets of digital scales, 4 marijuana pipes, 2 drug ledgers, marijuana cigarette butts, 8 boxes of 12gauge shot gun ammunition, 2 boxes of .22 caliber ammunition, one North American Arms .22 caliber revolver, and 1 Remington Shotgun, were found in the residence. Goedeke is a convicted felon and is prohibited of possessing firearms. Investigator Jamie Ketner LCSO, made the arrest.

Lisa Tackett, 53, Hardin Street Loudon, was charged with DUI, and Simple Possession. very seriously. Hoax threats are not a joke, and they can have devastating consequences—both for the public and for the perpetrators.

Issuing a threat—even over social media, via text message, or through e-mail—is a federal crime (threatening interstate communications). Those who post or send these threats can receive up to five years in federal prison, or they can face state or local charges.

With a thoughtless remark on social media, young people risk starting out their adult lives in prison and forever being labeled a felon.

“The Bureau and its law enforcement partners take each threat seriously. We investigate and fully analyze each threat to determine its credibility,” said FBI Deputy Director David Bowdich. “Hoax threats disrupt school, waste limited law enforcement resources, and put first responders in unnecessary danger. We also don’t want to see a young person start out adulthood with a felony record over an impulsive social media post. It’s not a joke; always think before you post.”

In addition to consequences for individuals who issue threats, there is also a sig-

nificant societal cost. Law enforcement agencies have limited resources, and responding to hoax threats diverts officers and costs taxpayers. The threats can also cause severe emotional distress to students, school personnel, and parents.

Here are a few examples of serious threats that the FBI and our partners have investigated:

A young man in Texas used social media and a phone to issue threats against schools in Minnesota. He also called in fake hostage situations, known as “swatting.” He was arrested, pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to more than three years in federal prison. He was 19 at the time of sentencing.

A 21-year-old South Carolina man was sentenced to one year in federal prison after he sent text messages claiming there was a bomb in the parking lot of a Veterans Affairs Medical Center in the state.

An 18-year-old North Carolina man was sentenced to 22 months in federal prison and was ordered to pay restitution after he broadcast himself on the Internet calling in bomb threats to various public places, including schools, colleges, and FBI offices.

What Should I Do?

Don’t ever post or send any hoax threats online... period.

If you are a target of an online threat, alert your local law enforcement immediately.

If you see a threat of violence posted on social media, immediately contact local law enforcement or your local FBI office. Members of the public can always submit a tip to the FBI at tips.fbi.gov.

Notify authorities but don’t share or forward the threat until law enforcement has had a chance to investigate—this can spread misinformation and cause panic.

If you are a parent or family member, know that some young people post these threats online as a cry for attention or as a way to get revenge or exert control. Talk to your child about the proper outlet for their stress or other emotions, and explain the importance of responsible social media use and the consequences of posting hoax threats.

 identified as Deborah Ford and the passenger as Karen Etherton. Deputy asked Ms. Ford what they were doing and she stated nothing. Ms. Etherton could not be still and her hands were shaking. Deputy could smell the odor of Marijuana coming from the vehicle. Ms. Ford then sprayed perfume on her and in the vehicle. While speaking to Ms. Ford outside the vehicle Deputy observed Ms. Etherton attempting shove a black and red case down the right side of her pants. Depu-

ty asked Ms. Etherton to hand him the case and asked what was in the case. Ms. Etherton stated the case contained pills. Found in the case was (10) baggies of crystal meth (11.8 grams) individually packaged for resale. Deputy asked Ms. Etherton if there was anything illegal in the vehicle and she stated Paraphernalia. Deputy asked Ms. Ford for consent to search her vehicle and she agreed. Found in Ms. Ford's purse in a tin can was a Suboxone strip. Found in Ms. Etherton's purse was digital scales, rolling papers, a drug ledger,

baggies, torch, and a bowl with meth residue. The Crystal meth was tested by Inv Stanley and did test positive. Deborah Ford and Karen Etherton were taken into custody and transported to the Loudon County jail. This did happen in Loudon County.
