The clerk frequently falsified purchasing documents by providing inaccurate descriptions of the items she bought. She also utilized the utilities' tax-exempt status to



Beginning 1958, Kramer coached three difto undefeated records, three years in a row. Certainly, a sign of things to come, he then began coaching on the college level in 1967 at Central Michigan University. Kramer stayed at Central Michigan for eleven seasons, compiling an impressive record of 83-32-2. In 1974, he was named Coach of the Year and his team won the NCAA Division II National Champi- and the inaugural onship.


And yet,

these accomplish-Kramer's ments, true impact on college athletics was only just beginning. In 1978, he returned Foundation to his home state of Tennessee as Vanderbilt's Director of for orchestrating the renovation of the McGugin Center, but he also piloted the construction of Vanderbilt Stadium.

In January 1990, Kramer left Vanderbilt to become sixth commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. During his twelve years as commissioner, the SEC experienced unparalleled growth. In his first year as commissioner, two new members were added (South Carolina and Arkansas). He guided the conference in formulating divisional play · Division I-A conferwith ence football cham- Kramer Award. pionship game. In

1998, Kramer was awarded the Distinguished American Award by the National Football and College Hall of rame.

During his time with the SEC, the conference won 81 national championships – the most ever in a decade by the league. He oversaw the distribution of a thenleague record \$95.7 million to its meminstitutions for 2001 - 2002. Kramer negotiated multi-sport national television packages with CBS and ESPN, featuring football and men's and women's basketball through the 2008 - 2009 season. Because of his influence, the Men's and Women's SEC Athlete of the Year Award is presented annually as the Roy F.

avoid paying sales taxes. Cleveland Utilities terminated her employment on May 2, 2018.

Comptroller investigators have referred their findings to the local district attorney

general.

"A key weakness in this situation was allowing the clerk to initiate a purchase request, order an item, receive the item, and approve the related invoice for payment," said Comptroller Justin P. Wilson. "These financial responsibilities should be separated between multiple individuals. This key internal control can help prevent fraud, waste, and abuse."


and unnerving and wonderful — further than you or I can see.


