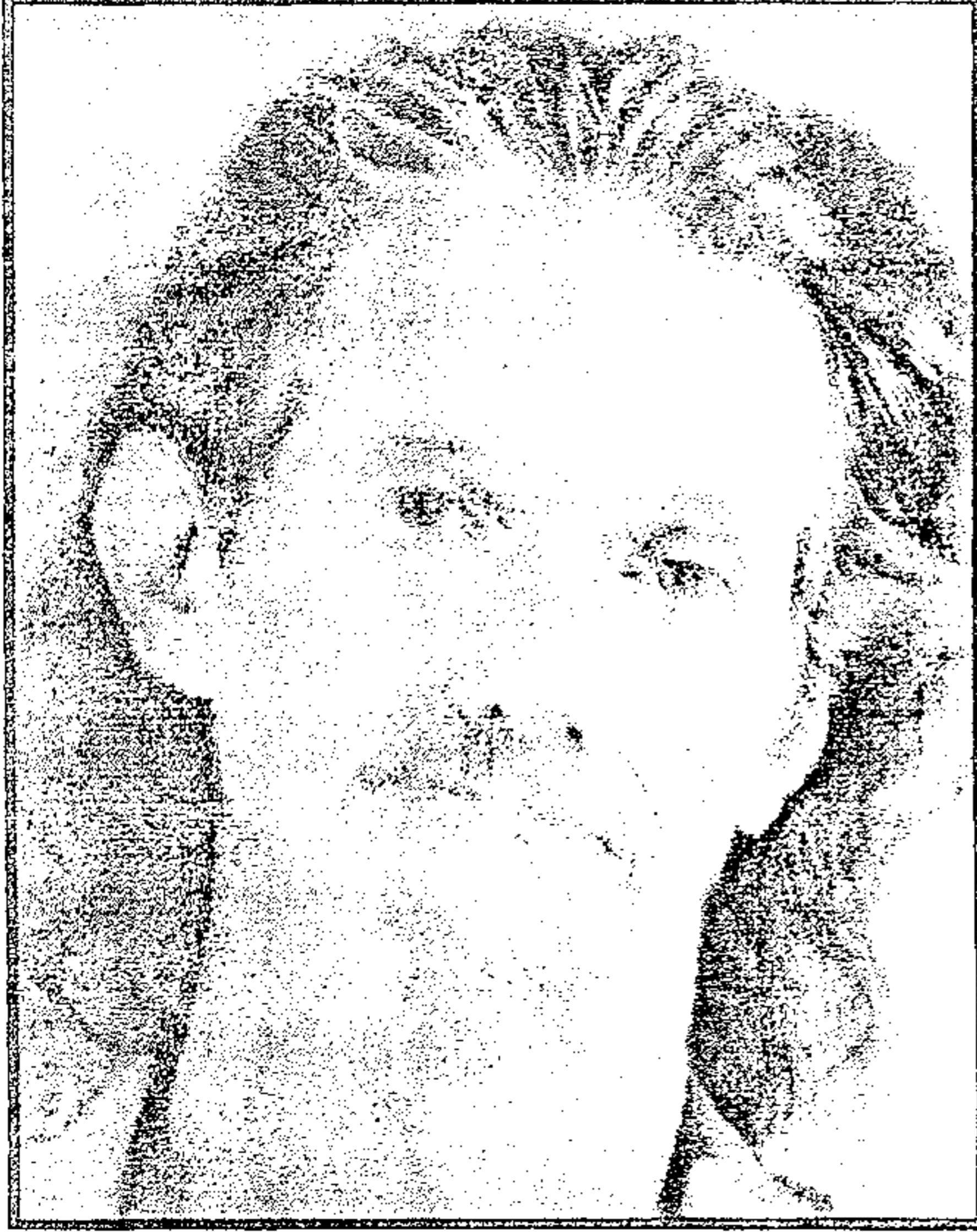

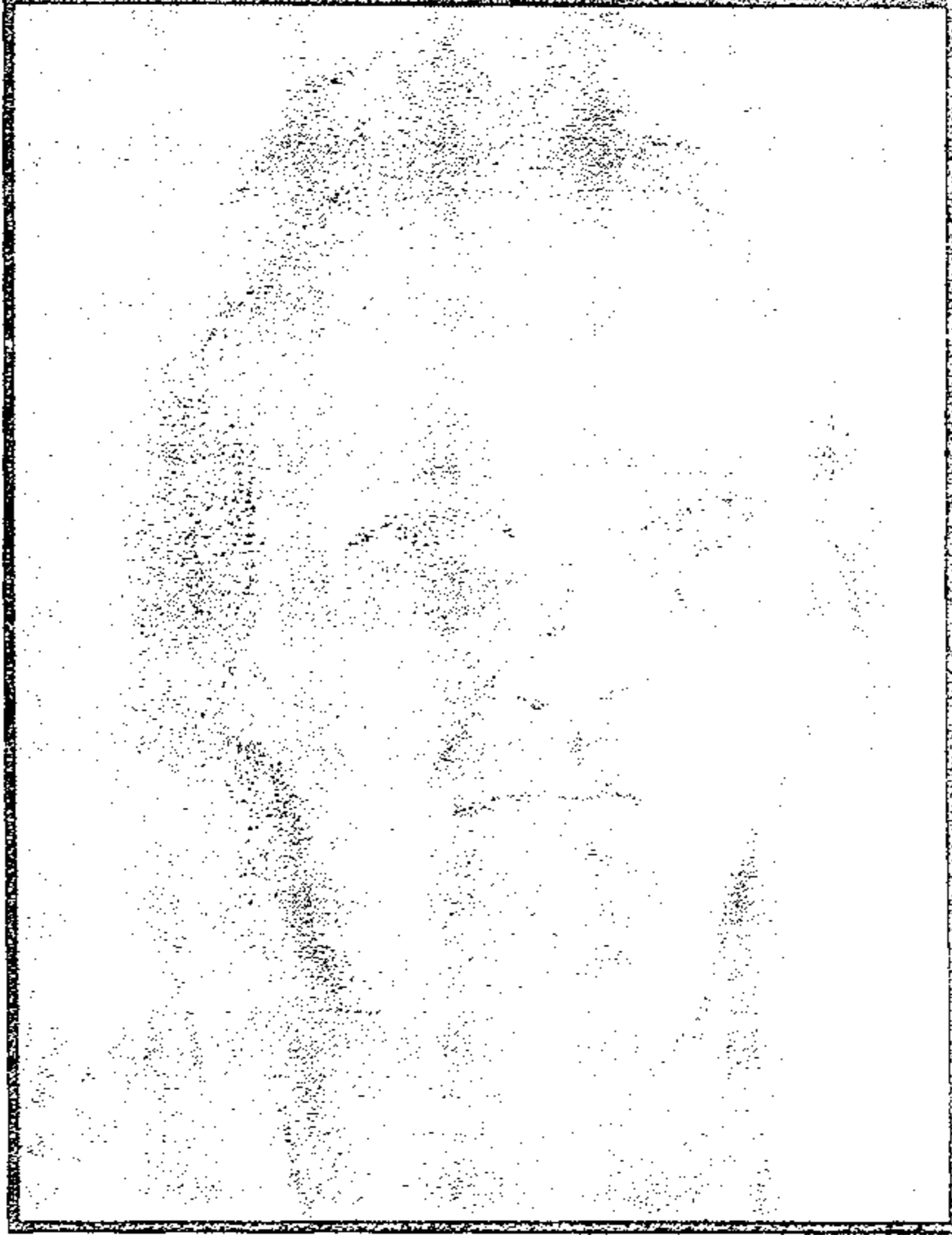

Our History, Our Service Special Agent Leo James McClairen: An Unheralded Pioneer

On January 15, 1956, the FBI office in Miami appointed its newest special agent. The next day, he was officially issued his badge, revolver, holster, handbook, and briefcase. His name was Leo

James McClairen, and his selection was quietly historic. It made McClairen the FBI's first African-American agent in the city of Miami and across the entire Deep South.

He was born a century ago, on Novem-

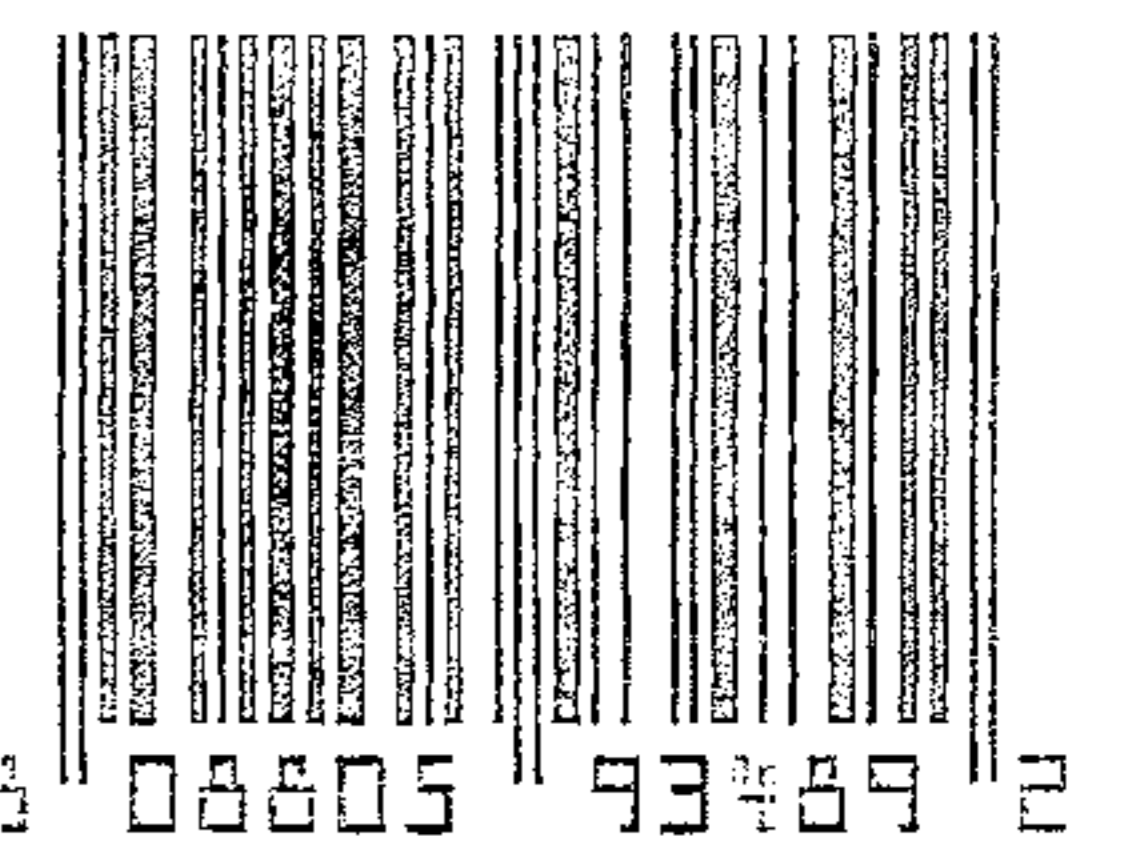

Dale Kryzak, 55, Hill Loop Madisonville, was charged with Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, Tampering/Fabricating with Evidence, and Simple Possession. Catherine Jenkins, 43, Dailey Ave Loudon, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II, Simple Possession, Poss. Of Drug Para., and Tampering/Fabricating with Evidence. Deputy Marshall Lynn LCSO,







Robert Morgan, 56, Fairview Road Lenoir City, was charged with Domestic Assault. Cpl. Z. Frye LCSO, responded to a possible verbal domestic. The victim stated she would meet the Deputy at the address on Fairview Road in 10 minutes. Deputy observed the party driving on Hwy 321 approx. a half mile from the residence. Deputy had dispatch call and tell them to pull off to the side of the road. Deputy made contact with the driver Robert Morgan and the passenger the victim. The victim stated they had been at Wild Wings, and had a few drinks. Victim stated she became upset because Morgan was speaking with other females. They left and headed back to Fairview Road where they both were staying. During the drive Morgan became upset and hit victim 2 to 3 times while driving back to the residence. Deputy

did observe a large red knot above victims left eye. Robert Morgan was placed under arrest.

While conducting an inventory of the vehicle Officer located several needles, glass pipe, plastic baggies, spoons with residue and char marks, and cut straw throughout England 3 purses. bed revealed a plastic bag , containing several baggies of crystal meth, which were numbered with the weight, marijuana, alprazolam, and suboxone strips. Several jewelry bags and digital scales were located inside the vehicle. Deputy located a meth pipe and 3 needles under Jenkins seat. Both Dale Kryzak, and Catherine Jenkins were placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

days before the

can-American agent
would submit his
application to the
young Bureau. Mc-
Clairen grew up in a
small town in south-
ern Georgia. He was
educated through
the 11th grade, at-
tended night school
for a few years, and
joined the military
in 1941.

McClairen served
bravely during
World War II, earn-
ing four service
medals for his ef-
forts in the Pacific
theater. Upon re-
turning home, he
worked various jobs
in Miami, mostly
for local airlines.

In the summer of
1952, McClairen—
by then 32 and
employed by the
General Services
Administration—
applied for a po-
sition in the FBI's
Miami Field Office
and was hired as a
clerk that Novem-
ber.

McClairen was
chosen as then-FBI

Director J. Edgar
Hoover's driver
when he vacationed
in Florida during
the holiday season.
Hoover, impressed
by the smart and
capable McClairen,
wrote letters of ap-
preciation in Janu-
ary 1954 and 1955.
The next year, Mc-
Clairen was pro-
moted to the agent
ranks.

McClairen's Bu-
reau career spanned
more than a quarter
century. Along the
way, he earned the
respect of his peers
and high marks
from his bosses,
who praised his de-
votion to his work.

As an agent, Mc-
Clairen handled a
variety of investi-
gative matters. His
ability to build trust
in communities of
color made him an
invaluable asset in
developing infor-
mants and pursuing
leads.

He especially ex-
celled at tracking
down people on the
run from the law, in-
cluding wanted fu-
gitives, military de-

Renfro pleaded
guilty on June 19,
2019, to distributing
child pornography.
The defendant ad-
mitted in Court that
he had placed an on-
line advertisement
offering to permit
other collectors of
child pornography
to engage in a live
online session with
an 8-year-old child
while the child was
in a bathtub. The
advertisement in-
cluded nude images
of an acquaintance's
child in a bathtub.
The defendant ad-
mitted that his goal
was to trade the live
sessions for images
of child pornogra-
phy. The defendant
surrendered his
electronic devices

to law enforcement
officials, and a
subsequent search
of his devices re-
vealed numerous
images of child
pornography.

"Individuals who
distribute child
pornography fur-
ther injure inno-
cent victims each
time these illegal
images are distrib-
uted more widely
online," said John
Condon, special
agent in charge of
Homeland Securi-
ty Investigations
Nashville. "Child
sex abuse is one
of the most serious
crimes HSI inves-
tigates due to the
lasting psycholog-
ical and physical
damage it can in-
flict on victims,
and as such it will
continue to be one
of the agency's
highest priorities."

United States At-
torney J. Douglas
Overbey empha-
sized the impor-
tance of seeking
lengthy terms of
imprisonment for
those convicted of
offenses involving
the exploitation of
children, stating,
"Defendants such
as Mr. Renfro are
dangerous pred-
ators, and our of-
fice will continue
in our vigorous
efforts to protect

serters, and escaped prisoners.

Special Agent Leo James McClairen

In one case, two U.S. Marshals had been searching unsuccessfully for a key witness in a trial. McClairen was asked to assist and found the man in just two hours. In another investigation, he received an award for his role in locating Top Ten fugitive Holice Paul Black, who fled to Miami after killing a Chicago police officer. A team player, McClairen did a great deal to support his colleagues, contributing in ways that didn't show up in his own statistics but buoyed the overall success of the office. That included participating in dangerous raids, conducting surveillance, and even fixing Bureau cars.

He often supported larger investigations, too. For example, in the mid-1960s, he played a key role in a racketeering probe that took down Gil "The Brain" Beckley, considered organized crime's top bookie in the country at the time. He also served for years as a highly regarded liaison with the Mi-

ami Police Department.

In October 1977, McClairen—nearing age 58—submitted a request for retirement.

"It has been a source of pride to have served my country through these years with the FBI," he wrote. "I will always value the friendships I have made here and my loyalty will ever remain with the Bureau."

McClairen retired on December 30, 1977. He died in Miami at the age of 85 on August 4, 2005.

Through his intelligence, integrity, and hard work during a time when there were few African-American agents, Leo McClairen served as an unheralded pioneer in the FBI. He paved the way for future generations of minority investigators and professional staff.

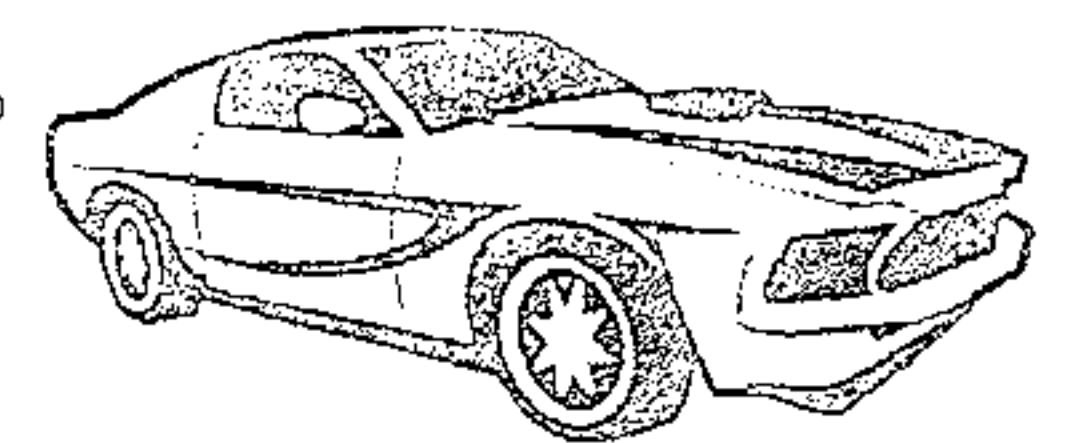
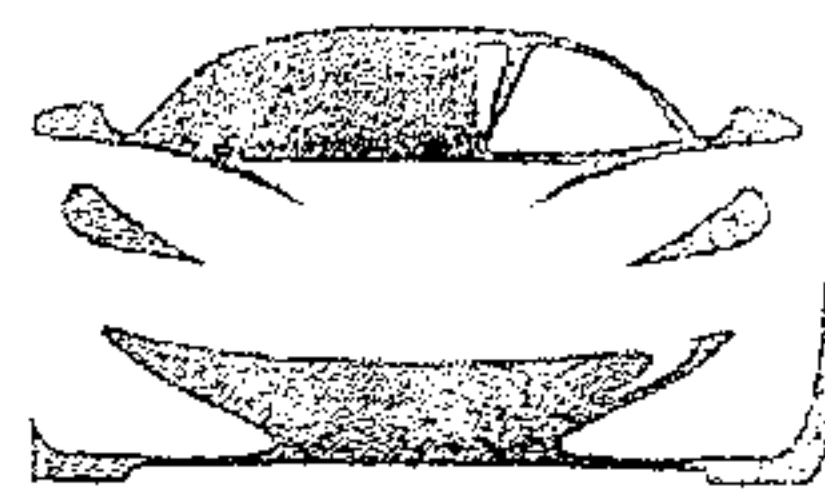
