

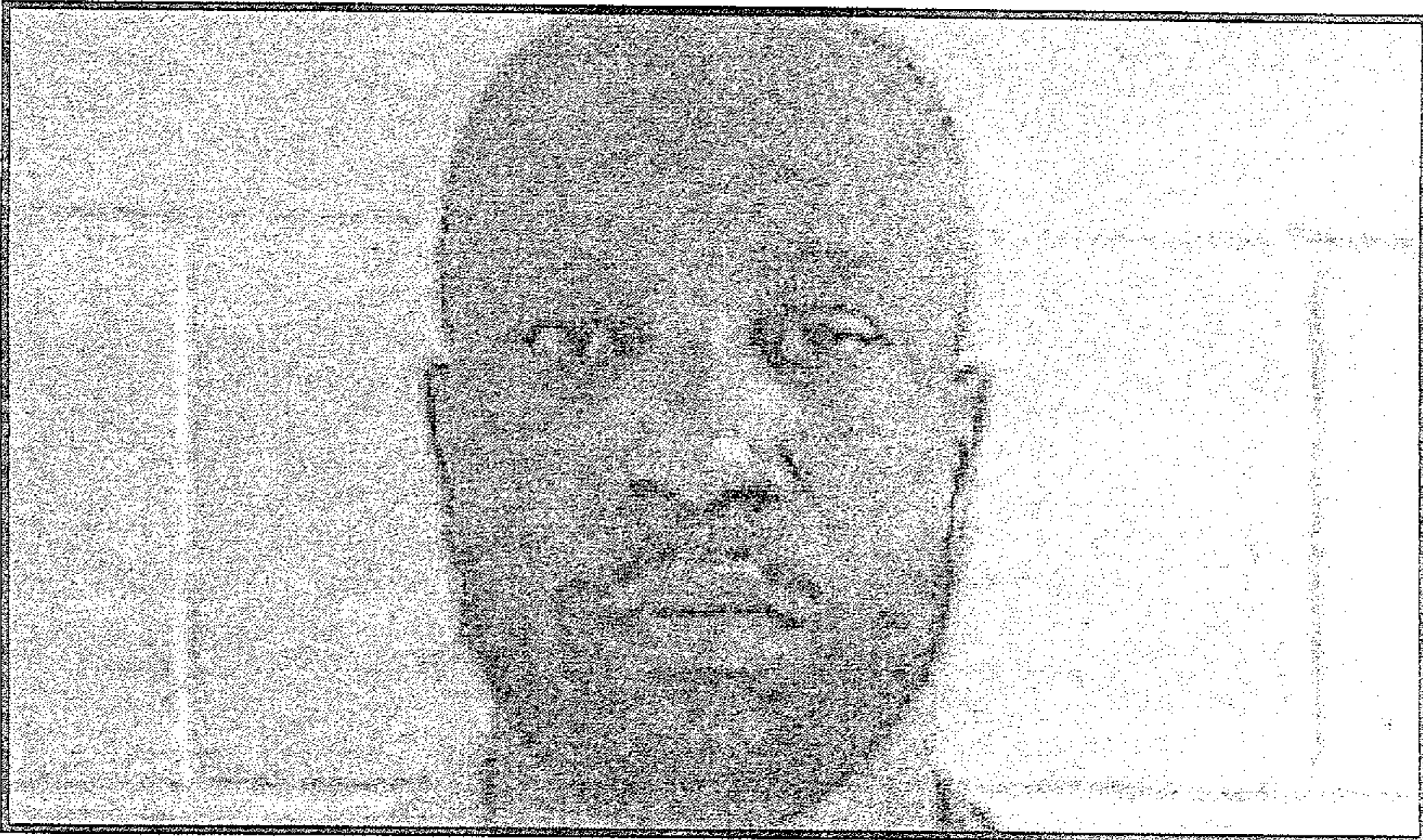

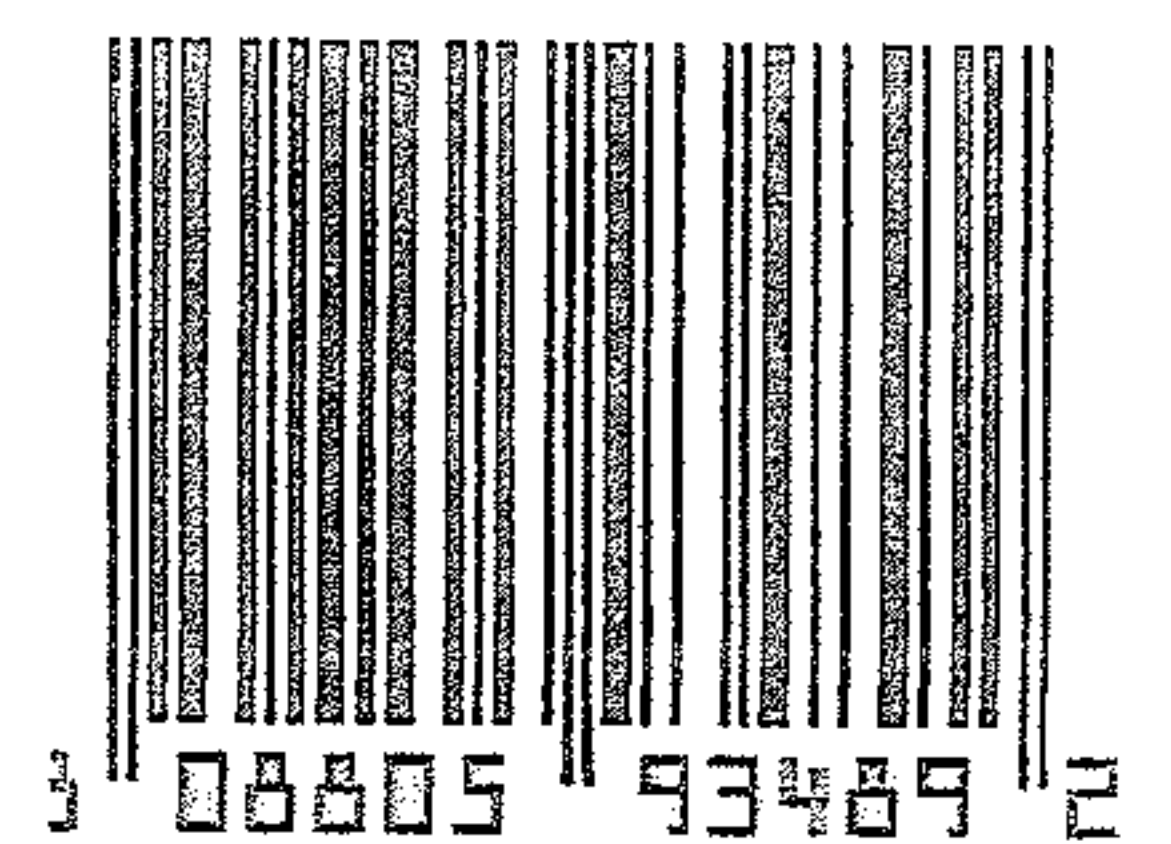
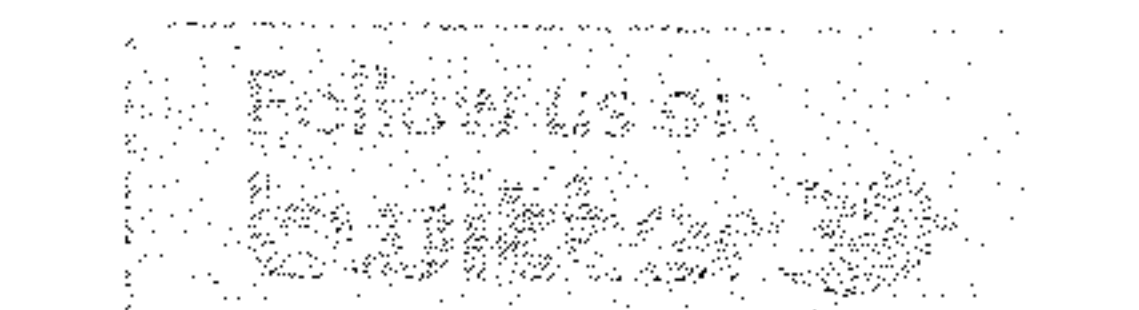

Officer from the Lenoir City Police Dept. responded to the TVA Employee Credit Union in reference to a false identification being used in an attempt to obtain a credit card loan. Upon arrival

The identification was confirmed to be counterfeit. The male stated his real name was Yasin Jamison, and provided his correct date of birth. Zakery Russell, 24, Vale Street Loudon, was charged with Statutory Rape. Officer Christopher Law LPD, was made aware that Zakery Russell had an active warrant. Officer made contact with Russell, it was confirmed of the active warrant, Zakery Russell was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

Arrest

Marco Munoz-Espinoza, 25, Church Street Loudon, was charged with Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II, and General Session Capias. Officer Law LPD, was dispatched to Vale Street in reference to a weapon being pulled. Once on scene Officer came in contact with a subject identified as Marco Munoz. Officer had prior knowledge Munoz had an active warrant and taken into custody. Once warrant was confirmed

Officer conducted a pat down on Munoz he ask for his license and when Officer opened Munoz's wallet he had a 2 one dollar bills folded up and a small plastic baggie of an unknown white powder substance. Officer open the dollar bills and a white powder substance was in both bills. All the powder substance was tested and came back positive for methamphetamine. Marco Munoz was transported to the Loudon County Jail.

"These federal resources will help to prevent school violence and give our students the support they need to learn, grow, and thrive," said Attorney General William P. Barr. 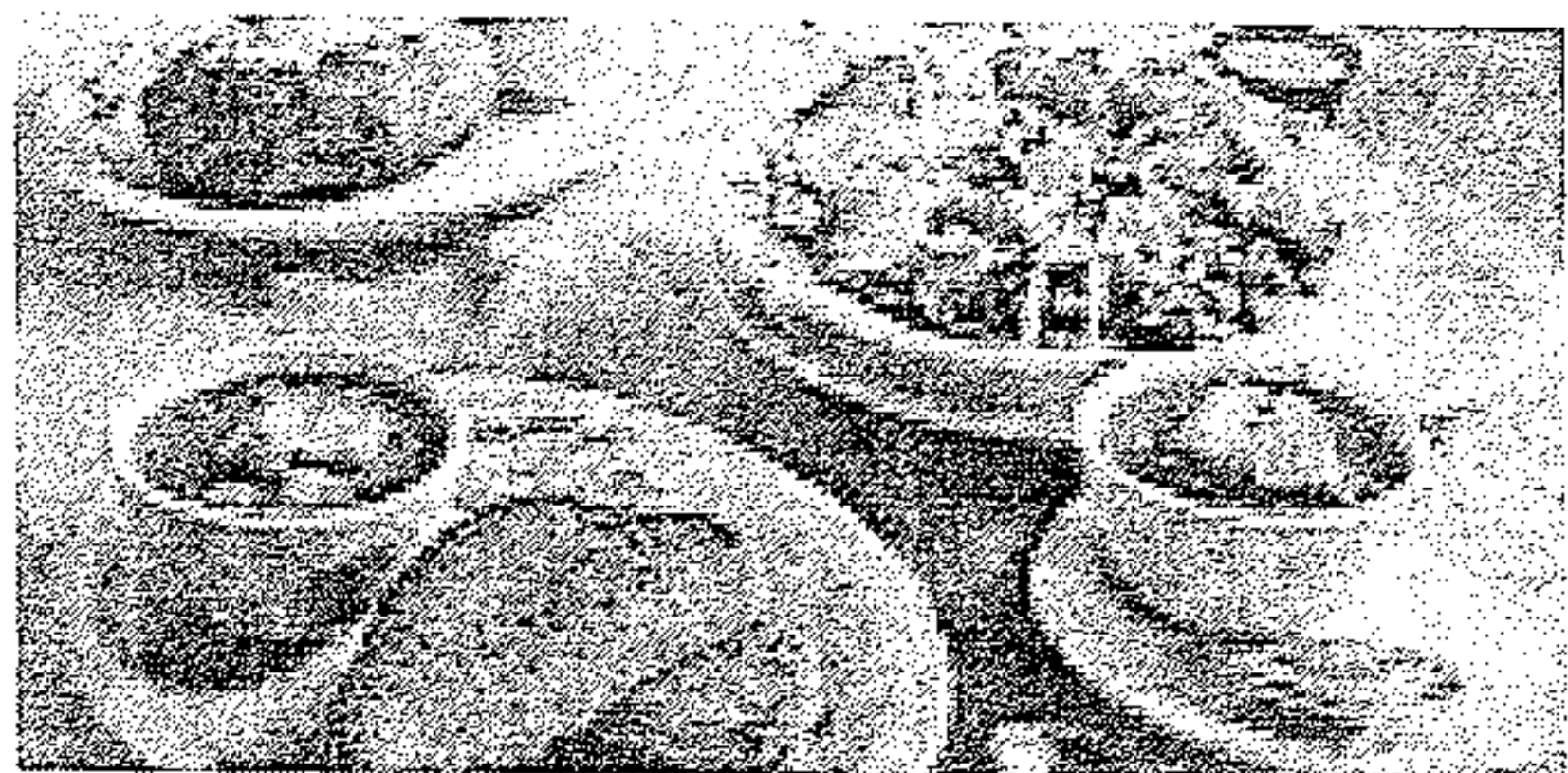

Services manage the programs and administer the grants, which include funds to:

- Develop school threat assessment teams and pursue technological solutions to improve reporting of suspicious activity in and around schools;
- Implement or improve school safety measures, including coordination with law enforcement, as well as the use of metal detectors, locks, lighting and other deterrent measures;
- Train law enforcement to help deter student violence against others and themselves;
- Improve notification to first responders through implementation of technology that expedites emergency notifications;
- Develop and operate anonymous reporting systems to encourage safe reporting of potential school threats;
- Train school offi-

cial to intervene when mentally ill individuals threaten school safety; and

• Provide training and technical assistance to schools and other awardees in helping implement these programs.

home from an interracial family in Cincinnati. They were evicted in November 2016 for not paying their rent.

After his eviction, Whitt returned to the apartment and broke in, according to Special Agent Pamela Kirschner, who investigated this case out of the FBI's Cincinnati Field Office.

In a destructive spree, Whitt spray-painted swastikas and racial slurs on walls throughout the home. He knocked out win-

dows, lit the gas stove and candles, and damaged the smoke detectors. He destroyed carpet, splashed paint throughout the home, tore the kitchen cabinets from the walls, and poured concrete into the plumbing. Before he left, he also removed the plumbing traps and turned on the water. This was not discovered for several days because the owners were out of town visiting family for the Thanksgiving weekend.

No one was injured, but the estimated damage totaled more than

 \$60,000. That cost, however, doesn't factor in the emotional devastation felt by the family who owned the home.
 After the couple's son had died prior to this crime, the family often spent time together at this house, which their daughter had lived

in. When the daughter moved away, the parents began renting out the home.
 "More than the physical destruction was the emotional destruction for this family. It was really a painful experience for them."

 Although the Cincinna-

ti Police Department quickly arrested Whitt on local charges, the FBI offered to collaborate on the investigation. The FBI brought to the case additional investigative resources and the option of seeking a federal hate crime charge against the perpetrator.
 Investigators found Whitt's fingerprints on a spray paint can at the home. Phone records and other evidence also placed him at the scene.

Whitt pleaded guilty in January to violating the Fair Housing Act through force. In September, he was sentenced to 54 months in prison and ordered to pay restitution. Whitt's sentencing memorandum described his actions as "not just the cost of being a landlord. It was a personal attack on their family and their identity."

"The victims were very grateful, especially for the hate crimes charge, because that matches how they felt," Kirschner said. "This wasn't a simple break-in. The family was violated, and the sentence reflects their story and what happened to them."
