knowledge of the children. An Officer was sent to the residence where Kofoed lives and her two children a 4 year old and a 7 month old were located in the residence with no adult supervision. Kofoed stated to Officer that she does occasionally leave the 4 year old at home alone and that she does her own thing. Heather Kofoed was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

scrutinize messages and requests that appear legitimate.” Some of the most common and damaging Internet-enabled crimes begin with an employee clicking a link in an email that appears to be from a colleague, following the instructions in a message that looks like it came from a supervisor, or opening an account link or invoice that seems to be from a trusted vendor. “These routine actions can be what exposes a computer or an entire network to a ransomware attack, data breach, or another crime,” said Gorham. “As we mark National Cybersecurity Awareness Month, our hope is to focus attention on the efforts required to safeguard individual computers and accounts and secure and protect critical data and infra-

structure.”

Now in its 16th year, National Cybersecurity Awareness Month is hosted every October by the Department of Homeland Security and the National Cyber Security Alliance. Multiple agencies and organizations, including the FBI, collaborate to raise awareness about cybersecurity and stress the collective effort needed to

stop cyber intrusions and online thefts and scams. “Today’s cyber threat is bigger than any one government agency—frankly, bigger than government itself,” FBI Director Christopher Wray said at a cybersecurity conference in March. “But I think no agency brings the same combination of

verified the sender's email address.

-Carefully scrutinize all electronic requests for a payment or transfer of funds.

-Be extra suspicious of any message that urges immediate action.

-Confirm requests for wire transfers or payment in person or over the phone as part of a two-factor authentication process. Do not verify these requests using the phone number listed in the request for payment.

"We look to the public and to organizations to engage by understanding these threats, taking preventive action, and reporting cyber crimes when they occur," said Gorham.

Child

Tennessee Department of Children's Services Commissioner Jennifer Nichols today named Sandra Wilson deputy commissioner of the department's Office of Child Programs. Wilson is a veteran child welfare professional with 34 years of experience in both Tennessee and Kentucky and has served as interim deputy commissioner of child programs since April. As deputy commissioner, Wilson is responsible for child program

staff and operations in 12 twelve regions across the state. She also oversees all statewide child programs including child protective services assessments, foster care, adoptions, independent living services, non-custodial services, provider network development, and the Interstate Compact on the Placement of Children (ICPC).

"We were fortunate to have someone as knowledgeable and experienced as Sandra already on our team to step into the interim role earlier this year; she has proven she is up to the challenge of leading the office and inspiring the Child Programs staff across the state to stay focused every day on helping children and families," Commissioner Nichols said. "Sandra's entire career has been driven by helping improve the lives of our most vulnerable citizens, and she brings a wealth of personal perspective to the role of deputy commissioner."

Wilson joined DCS in 2005 as a consultant to help improve regional organizational and operational practices throughout the department. She later oversaw the development, coordination, and monitoring of activities associated with federal funding requirements; helped form a statewide

workgroup that led to the department's accreditation; evaluated all program areas to determine right-sizing, and was responsible for improving the department's case manager mentoring program.

"Over the past several months, while serving as interim deputy commissioner of child programs, I have acquired an even deeper appreciation for the dedicated staff and community partners who serve our children and families daily," Wilson said. "Collectively, they embrace a culture of engaging and strengthening families through a shared commitment to improving the quality of child welfare practice. I am honored and excited to be a part of that culture."

Prior to joining DCS, Wilson served seven years for the Kentucky Department of Community Based Services as a service region administrator in Louisville, with leader-

ship and oversight responsibility for child welfare, adult protective services, the federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program, child support and Medicaid programs administered by a staff of 750 at 10 locations throughout the metro area. She also spent 12 years with the Kentucky

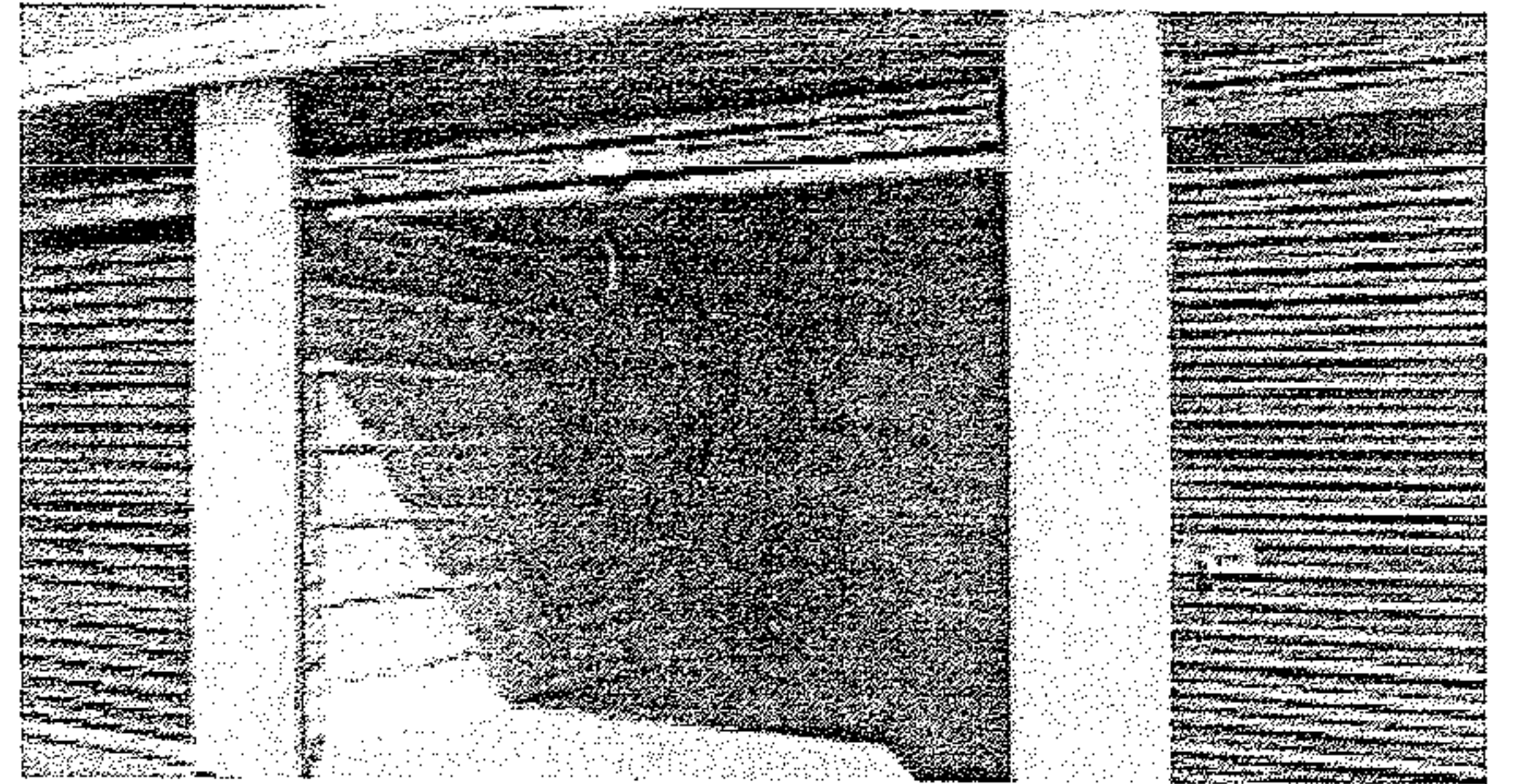
Department of Human Resources as a regional administrator.
