## 2018 Hate Crime Statistics Released Report Shows Slight Decline in Incidents from 2017 to 2018

The number of hate crime incidents reported to the FBI decreased slightly from 2017 to 2018, according to the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program's annual Hate Crime Statistics report, released today.

Law enforcement reported 7,120 hate crimes to the FBI's UCR Program last year, down slightly from the 7,175 incidents reported the previous year.

There were 7,036 single-bias hate crimes reported to

UCR in 2018. From those incidents, there were 8,646 victims. The majority of the reported hate crimes were motivated by race, ethnicity, or ancestry bias (59.6 percent). Additional biases included religion (18.7 percent), sexual orientation (16.7 percent), gender identity (2.2 percent), disability (2.1 percent), and gender (0.7 percent).

The report, Hate Crime Statistics, 2018, includes hate crime information for last year. The data is broken down by location, offenders, bias types, and victims.

More than 16,000 law enforcement agencies reported their hate crime statistics to the FBI last year. The FBI has been working with law enforcement across the country to encourage reporting of hate crime statistics. Reporting hate crime data to the UCR Program helps the public and researchers gain a more accurate picture of hate crimes. It also allows law

enforcement to develop data-focused approaches to combating hate crimes.

Hate crimes are the highest investigative priority of the FBI's civil rights program.

district Judge, to serve 262 months in federal prison for producing and possessing child pornography. Following his imprisonment, Wilson will be supervised by the U.S. Probation Office for 15 years and will be required to register with the state sex offender registry in any state in which he lives, works, or attends school.

The investigation began when Wilson sent nude photographs of minors via an online chat application to an undercover FBI agent. The investigation confirmed that Wilson had taken the photographs that he had sent to the undercover FBI agent. "This prosecution represents part of our efforts to work with law enforcement agencies to

protect children from persons who produce child pornography for trade on the internet," said J. Douglas Overbey, U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Tennessee. U.S. Attorney Overbey explained, "these predators operate from the shadows of the internet, and find others who are interested in pornographic depictions of children. They use their pornography as online 'currency' to trade with others, leading to further sexual abuse of children and the circulation of these terrible depictions of abuse around the world."

The case was investigated the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Assistant U.S. Attorney Matthew T. Morris represented the United States at in Court.

"We produce honey from our apiaries along with eggs from our chickens and quail," Sledge said. "We grow a variety of perennial fruits. Our fruit trees, bushes, and vines currently consist of apples, plums, peaches, mulberries, blueberries, blackberries, elderberries, strawberries, and grapes."

Bright Hill Bed and Barn owners Rick and Karyn Walker served in the Air Force for 22 years. They visited Tennessee a few times between assignments and loved everything about the state. "We dreamed of living on a farm after retirement," Karyn said. "We

have six acres in DeKalb County where we grow blueberries and sell eggs from our chicken flock."

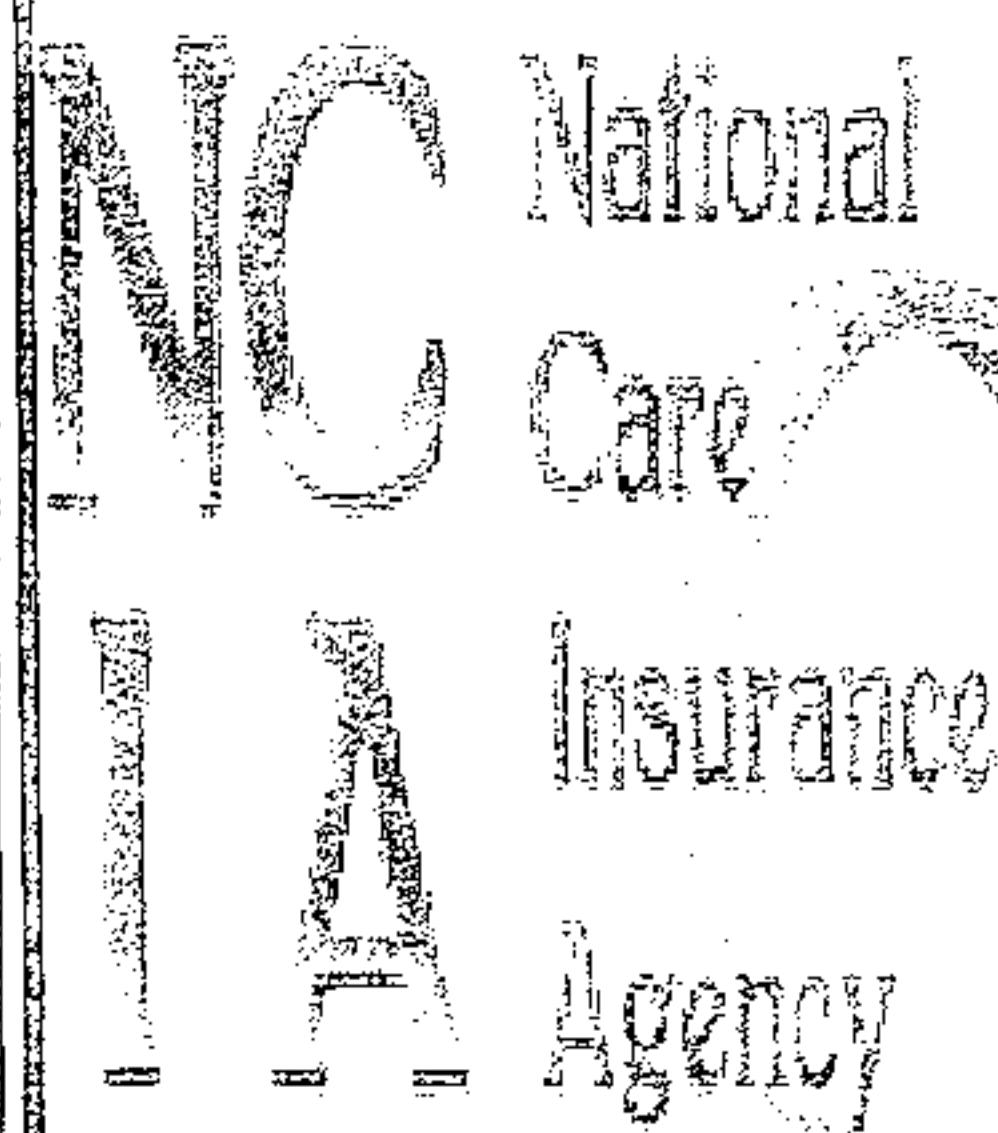
