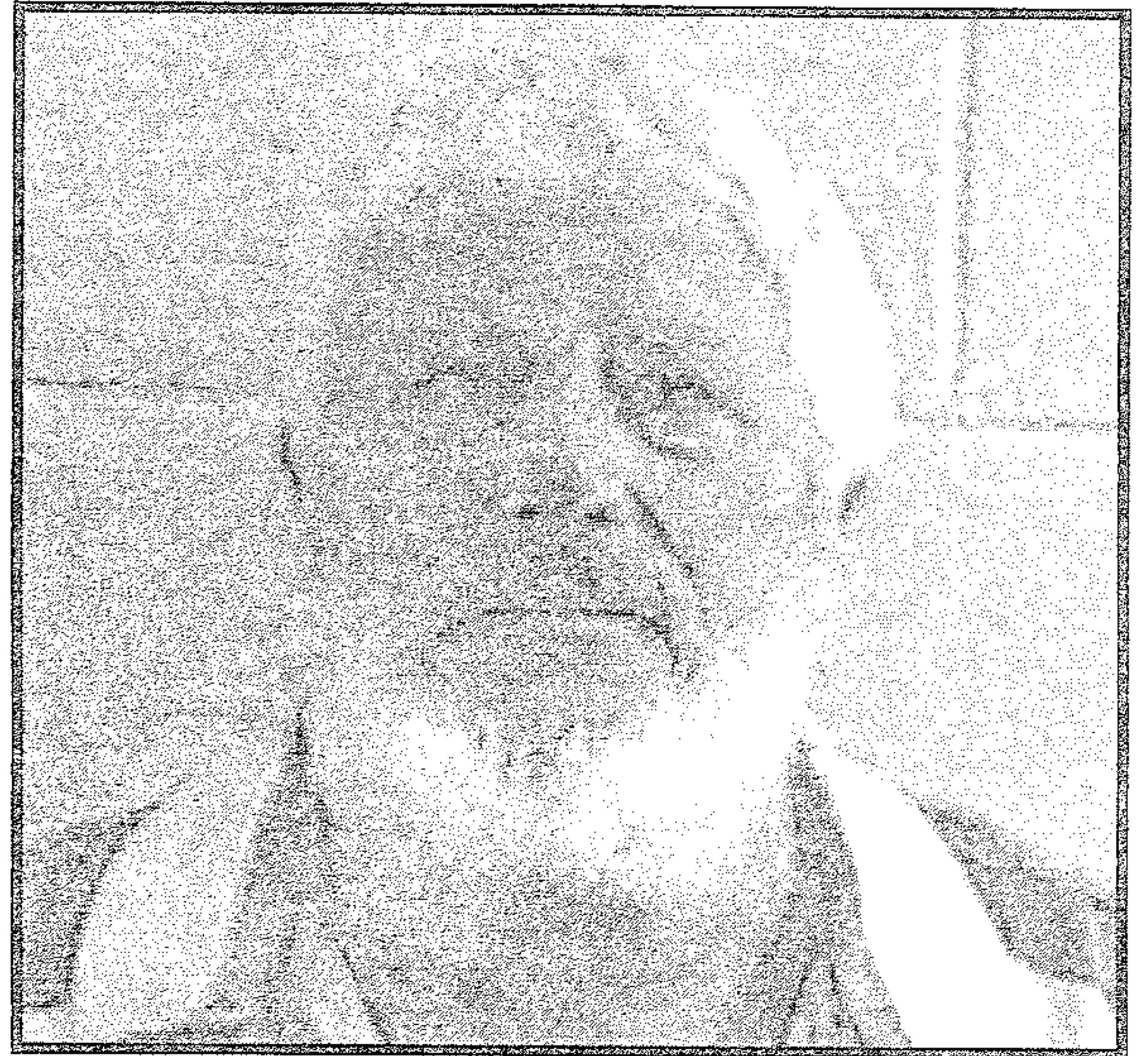

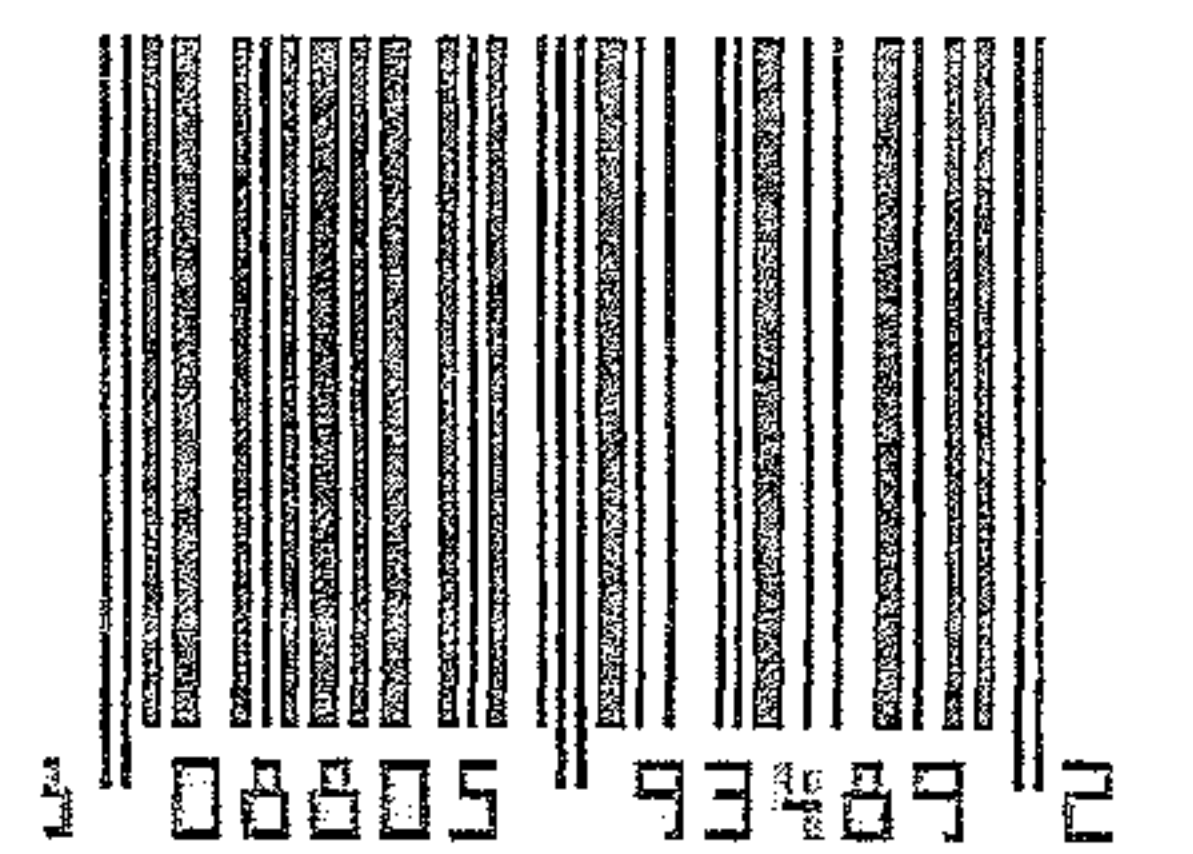

Philip Calage, 66, Bayside Drive Ten Mile, was charged with DUI, and Open Container. Officer A. Bialek LCPD, was dispatched to the area of Hwy 321 N and Town Creek Pkwy in regards to a white work van all over the roadway. "I am grateful for our partners both nationally and here in Tennessee who share our goal of saving lives and preventing fire fatalities," said Tennessee State Fire Marshal and Tennessee Department of Commerce and Insurance Commissioner (TDCI) Hodgen Mainda. "I remind my fellow Tennesseans to stay warm and safe this winter by following our fire safety tips and making sure that the smoke alarms in their homes are working properly." During winter, the risks to homeowners rise as fire deaths increase by almost 75 percent across Tennessee. Heating equipment is the leading cause of home fire deaths nationally and the second leading known cause in Tennessee. The Tennessee State Fire Marshal's Office recently debuted new television and radio commercials to raise awareness about the impor-

tance of fire safety during Tennessee's coldest months.

Consumers who need working smoke alarms are urged to contact their local fire department and ask if they participate in the SFMO's "Get Alarmed, Tennessee!" free smoke alarm program. Since the "Get Alarmed, Tennessee!" program began in November 2012, volunteers from over 530 Tennessee fire departments and civic organizations have distributed over 217,000 working smoke alarms across the Volunteer State.

Since the program's inception, 279 people have been alerted by working smoke alarms installed through "Get Alarmed."

"It's important to stay warm during Tennessee's frigid winter months, but it's equally as important to practice good fire-safe behavior, too," said TDCI Assistant Commissioner Gary Farley. "Before winter arrives, take the time to ensure that you and your family know two ways out of every room in the event of a home fire."

In addition to using working smoke alarms, Tennesseans are advised to remember:

- Keep flammable items like blankets or furniture at least three feet away from space heaters and wood stoves.

- Practice a home fire escape plan with your family. Everyone should know two ways out of each room.

- Never smoke in a home where medical oxygen is present. The increased presence of oxygen in the air makes fire burn hotter and faster.

- Always turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.

- Never use your oven to heat your home.

- Have heating equipment and chimneys inspected every year.

- Burn only dry, seasoned wood in fireplaces and woodstoves. Never burn garbage or use flammable liquids to start a fire.

- Make sure any fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying out. Ashes should be cool before disposing of them in a metal container.

Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.

- Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning.

- If you smell gas coming from your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

- If you live in a home or apartment with fire sprinklers, make sure there is pressure on the gauge and call your local fire department if you have any questions.

Online Personalized License Plate Application Now Available

The Department of Revenue is pleased to offer Tennesseans the ability to apply for a personalized license plate online, rather than through a paper application.

The online application, available at personalizedplates.revenue.tn.gov, allows residents to select from more than 100

types of Tennessee license plates that are available to personalize. After selecting their plate design, customers then type in their desired configuration on their plate. They will know immediately if the configuration is available, based on a red or green box that will appear around the plate.

Customers can pay the \$35 personalized plate application fee online, and later pick up their plate at their local county clerk's office. Additional fees will apply at the county clerk's office when a customer picks up the plate. Specialty plates also require an additional \$35 fee.

"We are pleased to partner again with BIS to offer Tennesseans this added convenience," Commissioner David Gerregano said. "This online application should make the personalized plate process even quicker and easier for residents." There are more than 56,000 personalized plates on Tennessee roads. The \$35 personalization fee helps support the Tennessee Arts Commission.

 tricts in Tennessee received precisely the amount of money they were due under the statutorily defined funding formula. The Comptroller's Office found only two minor points for revision. In total, these revisions amounted to a net overallocation of \$6,000 in state funding to Tennessee school districts. This averages out to an error rate of

approximately 1.2 pennies for each \$10,000 distributed. The verification found that one district was underpaid by \$1,000, and four districts received a total overpayment of \$7,000. The remaining 137 districts had no change in funding. "A discrepancy of \$6,000 is about as close to zero as you can get when you're dealing with a total calculation of \$4.8 billion," said Comp-

troller Justin P. Wilson. "I commend the Department of Education on the accuracy of this year's BEP calculation." This is the fourth consecutive fiscal year the Comptroller's Office has reviewed the state's BEP calculation for accuracy. The Office also brings transparency to the BEP formula by making a BEP Calculator available to all Tennesseans on its website. The calculator has been updated for fiscal year 2019-20.
