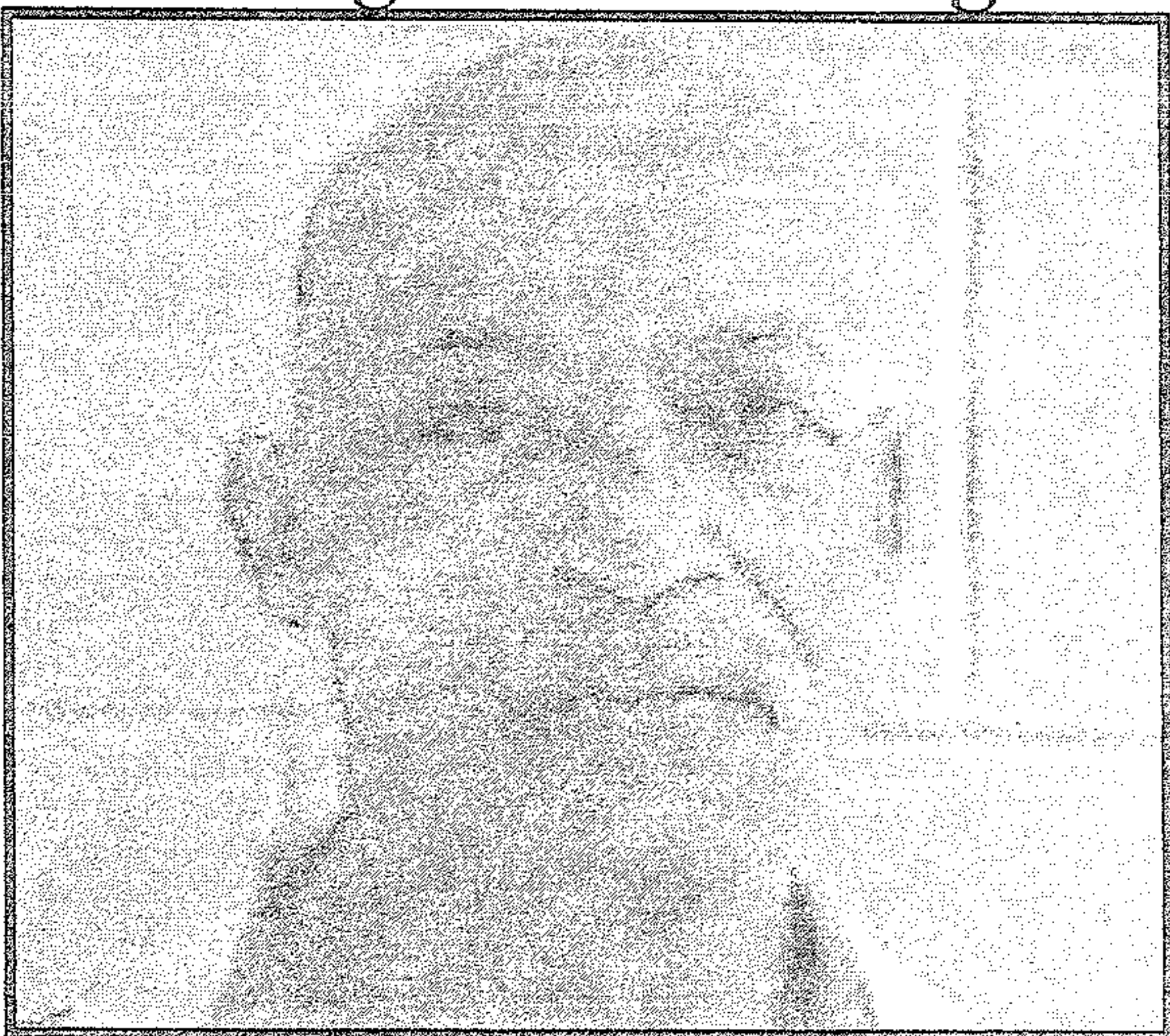

Albany-area families had every reason to trust attorney Albert Hessberg III with their wills and estates. A partner at a major law firm for decades, Hessberg came from a prominent family and had deep ties to the community.

But when some families of Hessberg's clients tried to access trust funds after their relatives' deaths, Hessberg gave them the run-around. He encouraged them to be patient, saying he needed more

Kevin Miller, 29, Church Street Loudon, was charged with Capias, Contraband in a Penal Institution, and Man/Sell/Del/Resale Sch. II & VI. Officer Charles Watson LCPD, observed a vehicle traveling on Old Hwy 95 without functional registration lights. Officer stop the vehicle at Kingston Pike Baptist Church. Officer made contact with Kevin Miller in the rear passenger seat of the vehicle. Dispatch advised Miller had an active Capias Warrant out of General Session. Deputy Partin and Jenkins LCSO observed a white vehicle pull into what appeared to be a business at Beals Chapel Road. Deputies made contact with the driver and passenger, and ask then why they stopped at a business that was closed. They stated that a friends farther lived there, but did not know his name. Cpl. Fagiana arrived on scene, during this time they observed the front door to the business was ajar. Deputy knocked on the door several times and could not make any contact with anyone inside. Dispatch attempted to call the number that the driver provided for the person that was suppose to be inside but the number was disconnected. When Deputies made entry to ensure the business was secure and to check the welfare of the person inside. Once inside Deputy encountered Ralph Piety who

stated he lived there. Deputy then advised Piety why they were there and observed a loaded gun on the table along with looses marijuana, and a black box. Deputy also observed a small marijuana plant growing in the living room. Piety gave consent to search the premises and the black box. Inside the box was 21.60 grams of marijuana, a grinder, scales, and several small baggies. Dispatch advised Piety had a warrant out of Knox. County. Ralph Piety was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

time to handle complex estates. He accused them of being greedy and pitted family members against each other. Eventually, one client's family member grew suspicious enough to alert his law firm, which, in turn, brought in the FBI.

Investigators soon learned that Hessberg had stolen more than \$2 million from his clients over a period of 12 years.

Financial documents backed up what the victim told investigators. After poring through Hessberg's records, investigators discovered the fraud went back more than a decade. He had stolen from at least 15 trusts during that time. There were numerous victims, since many trusts had multiple beneficiaries.

FBI agents spoke to one victim who tried to access his deceased parents' trust. He needed the funds to pay for medical care for his sister who had

cancer. Hessberg used delay tactics, and the sister died before the family received any money. If Hessberg had disbursed the funds, the sister may have been able to pursue other cancer treatment options, the victim told the FBI. "She had a medical necessity for this money. The parents set this money aside for their children years ago," said Special Agent Vinesh Manglavil, who investigated this case out of the FBI's Albany Field Office. "The victim passed away and never got the treatment she could have had. That's when we knew there was a real emotional impact in this case, not just financial."

Vinesh Manglavil, special agent, FBI Albany Hessberg used the money to pay for his own high-end living expenses, like vacations, country club

fees, and his children's tuition and weddings.

He got away with it for years because of his reputation and personal relationships with the families who were his clients. He'd even inherited many of his clients from his father, who was a lawyer at the same firm.

"A lot of the victims did not know their rights to these funds that their parents and grandparents had set up for them," Manglavil said. "They trusted this attorney to navigate the legal system for them, and he abused their trust and the personal relationships."

In May, Hessberg pleaded guilty to mail fraud, wire fraud, and filing a false tax return. He was sentenced to five years and eight months in prison in November.

The victims were able to recoup some of their lost funds. Hessberg's brother-in-law, singer James Taylor, and his sister, Caroline "Kim" Taylor, agreed to pay the \$1.7 million court-ordered restitution that Hessberg owed his victims.

While much of the money was recouped, the

emotional turmoil remains for Hessberg's victims. In the victim impact statements given to the judge in this case, victims described shattered dreams and damaged family relationships stemming from Hessberg's crimes.

"Hessberg intentionally misled us, over a period of many years, and intentionally planted seeds of distrust among our family members by varying the stories he told each of us," one victim wrote in an impact statement. The victim went on to say that Hessberg was "portraying himself as a reliable authority figure and casting us as 'greedy grandchildren.'"

For the FBI inves-

tigators, bringing some closure to the victims was the key focus of this case.

"We wanted justice to be served for these victims," said FBI Special Agent Christopher Murphy, who also worked on the case. "Anyone could find themselves in a similar situation, and we just wanted to make them whole as best we could. Hopefully, the justice system did that for them."

 university of Tennessee (UT) Board of Trustees. The audit includes 12 findings and eight observations focusing on several campus operations including security and safety, mental health services, student and faculty engagement, facilities, strategic plans and performance measures, tuition affordability, and athletics programs. A broad summary of the results is shown below:
 -The UT Board should encourage collaboration, coordination of resources, and communication between UT campuses to increase the effectiveness and efficiency of the UT system. (Finding 1 and Observation 3)
 -The UT Board should increase its oversight of various academic and non-academic areas to ensure UT is meeting its strategic and operational goals. The Board has a duty to oversee strategic planning, academics, admissions, tuition,

faculty evaluation and retention, student conduct and satisfaction, facility maintenance, and athletic operations. (Findings 2, 9, 11, and 12 and Observations 4, 6, and 8)
 -The UT Board must increase its oversight of student safety and campus security and ensure the accurate and complete reporting of safety and crime information. (Findings 3 through 10 and Observation 5)
 -The UT Board should ensure the UT System monitors the mental health services offered by each UT campus. (Finding 11)
 -"The UT Board of Trustees is the governing body for the UT system," said Comptroller Justin P. Wilson.

"Each board member has a personal responsibility to ensure that he or she is fulfilling his or her obligation to act in the best interest of the UT System. I am encouraged that board members are taking these findings seriously and are already working to correct weaknesses."

The Comptroller's Office will present these audit results to the Joint Government Operations Subcommittee on Education, Health and General Welfare on December 18, 2019 at 1:00 p.m. in House Hearing Room I.
