
2014 Nissan Pathfinder Loaded, 3rd Row Seat, Alloy Wheels, Like New, Great On Gas, PW, PL

number was ran through dispatch and the car was also stolen out of Knox County sheriff department (NIC#V560886088). The driver was identified as James W. Henry 3rd. His license is suspended for an accumulation of points and he has multiple driving

while suspended charges. A search of the car uncovered several small, plastic ziploc bags in an empty cigarette pack that contained drug residue (drug paraphernalia). Officer also found several needles used to inject the drugs that he was notified of prior to finding. A search of the trunk uncovered a 2 foot metal "slim

jim" used to get into locked cars. Several cell phones and jewelry were taken for processing. The defendant was arrested and transported to jail. Along with 2 passengers Charles Dyer, and Candace Roach. Said happened in Loudon TN.

DUI

Andrew Jackson, 23, Wassom Memorial Hwy Grand View, was charged with DUI, and Vehicular Assault. Trooper Nathaniel Crow THP, was dispatched to a wreck with injuries at Calloway Road in Loudon. Upon arrival Trooper was advised by LCSO Deputy that the passenger was transported by EMS to UT Medical after sustaining serious injuries including

the amputation of three fingers. Trooper then made contact with the driver Andrew Jackson who stated prior to the crash him and the passenger had been drinking at a friends house. Jackson stated that he had approx.. half case of beer. Trooper ask Jackson to estimate his level of intoxication being sober and being most intoxicated. Jackson stated a 6. Trooper had Jackson perform sobriety test which he did poorly on. Jackson was placed under arrest. Trooper spoke with the passenger who stated that Jackson had been drinking prior to driving and stated Jackson attempted to persuade her to claim she was driving.

“Seat belt use is very important to the safety of vehicle occupants. Occupants are injured or killed from being unrestrained. Many times, occupants strike the interior of the vehicle or are thrown out of the vehicle in crashes. This type of impact is dangerous and deadly. The Lenoir City Police Department hopes to increase seatbelt use through education and enforcement.” Said Chief Don White

2019 will be the sixth year the THSO has sponsored the SAFE campaign. Last year yielded the following results:

- 1,182 child restraint violations
- 13,165 seat belt citations
- 305 other seat belt enforcement activities

“In 2017, Tennessee’s average seatbelt usage rate was 88.51 percent,” said THSO Director Vic Donoho. “Last year, the usage rate was 88.77 percent. Through increased education, enforcement, and community involvement, we’re striving to

achieve 100 percent.”

This year, participating agencies will pay special attention to nighttime seatbelt enforcement. Tennessee has seen a disproportionate percentage of unrestrained fatalities between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 5:59 a.m. Historically, approximately fifty percent of Tennessee’s traffic fatalities are unbelted. That percentage increases to nearly sixty when nighttime crashes are examined.

David Miles, 26, W Second Ave Lenoir City, was charged with First Degree Murder, Theft of Property x2, and Especially Aggravated Burglary. Deputies responded to Lee HI St. to a report of shots being fired at the residence. On arrival Deputy met the complainant who stated a male came in with a shotgun and told complainant to go into another room so he could talk with the victim. Complainant heard shots and when he heard the vehicle leave and called police. After a search David Miles was later captured and taken to the Loudon County Jail.

drama from the Austin-East Magnet High School performing arts department; and a performance of the award-winning theatrical piece "The Cure" from students of Morristown West High School. Local historian and civil rights activist Robert Booker will be on site to sign copies of his newly re-released book *The Heat of a Red Summer*. The event is free and open to the public. In 1919, Knoxville exploded in a firestorm of racial hatred and violence when a black man was accused of murdering a white woman. Knoxville prided itself as an accepting, harmonious community that had sympathized with the North during the Civil War; there had never been a lynching and black residents could hold public office and serve as police officers. This outward geniality was shaken as veterans returned home from World War I to face a recession and job shortages. Tension between black citizens and working-class whites reached a fevered pitch. When Mrs. Bertie Lindsey was murdered in her home in August 1919, police arrested prominent mixed-race businessman Maurice Mays, despite a glaring lack of evidence. An angry white mob stormed the jail where they erroneously believed Mays was being kept and then turned their attack to downtown Knoxville. Black business owners violently defended their livelihoods from the looting rioters and the National Guard was brought in to try to

quell the assault. After two days of chaos, the death toll was reportedly in the dozens. While downplayed by many community leaders, the 1919 Knoxville Race Riots had a profound effect on the black community and prompted hundreds of black families to move out of the city permanently. Beck President Reneé Kesler says, "The summer of 1919 is critically important. The NAACP was formed in Knoxville in early August of that year with James G. Beck, the center's namesake, as the first Secretary; the race riots occurred at the end of that month and just a few weeks later women, African American included, would go to the polls and vote for the first time in Knoxville. History must never be left alone, we must wrestle with it until all are set free and until this world is a better place to live."

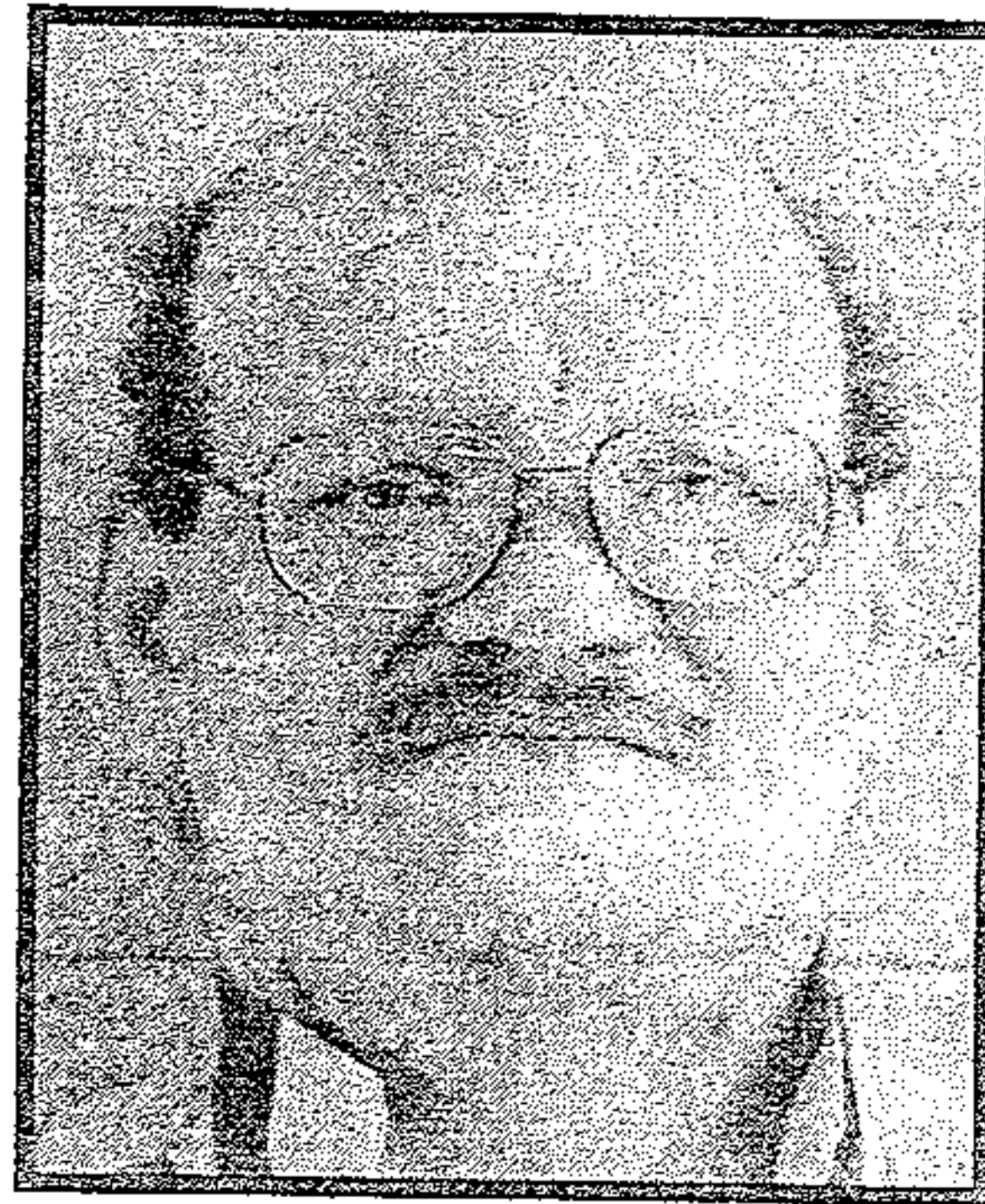

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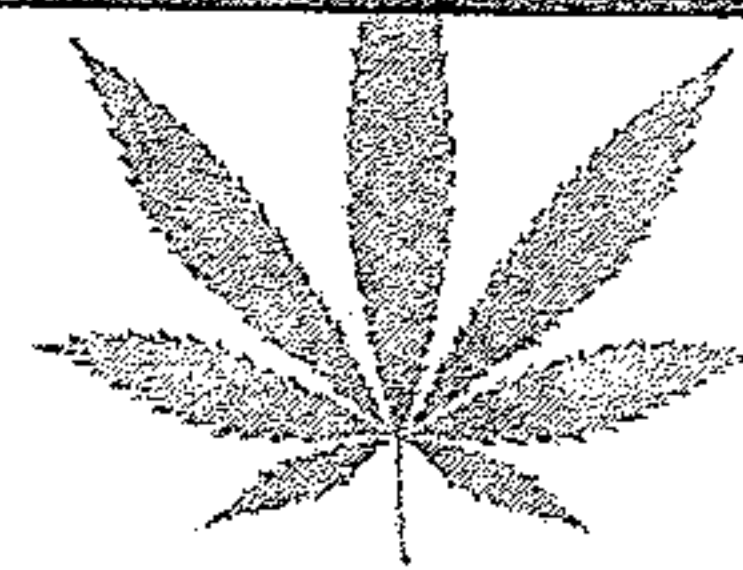
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
