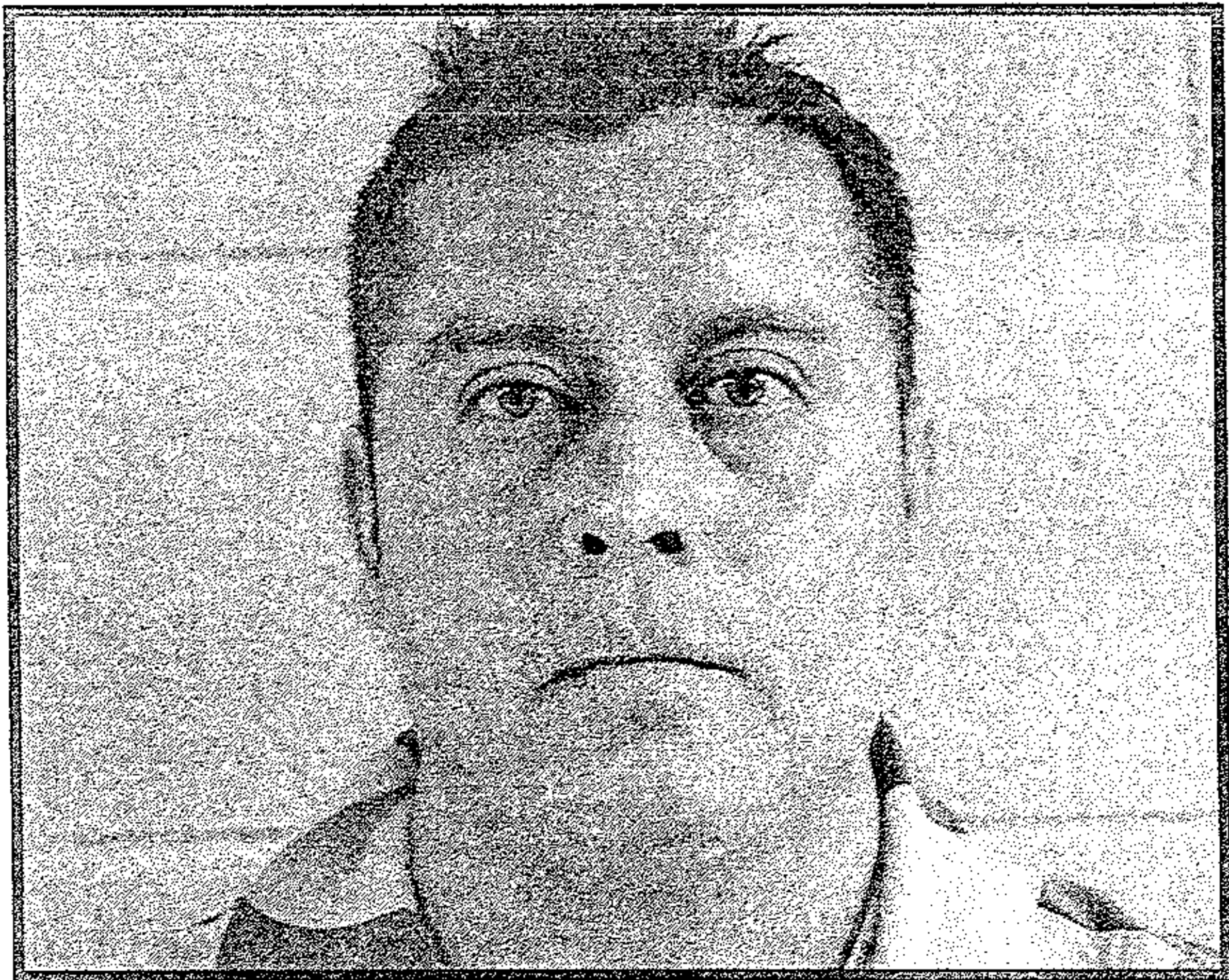

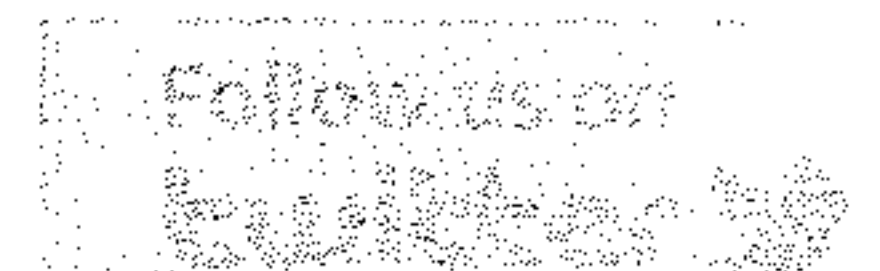
Tips on Helping Wildlife

Have you ever asked yourself, "What can I do to help wildlife in Tennessee?" The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency has a few helpful suggestions.

1. Buy a fishing or hunting license (even if you don't fish or hunt) - License dollars are the main source

of revenue for the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency that conserves and manages more than 1,400 species of wildlife in Tennessee. Especially for those who don't hunt or fish, there is now a "Friend of Wildlife" license package available

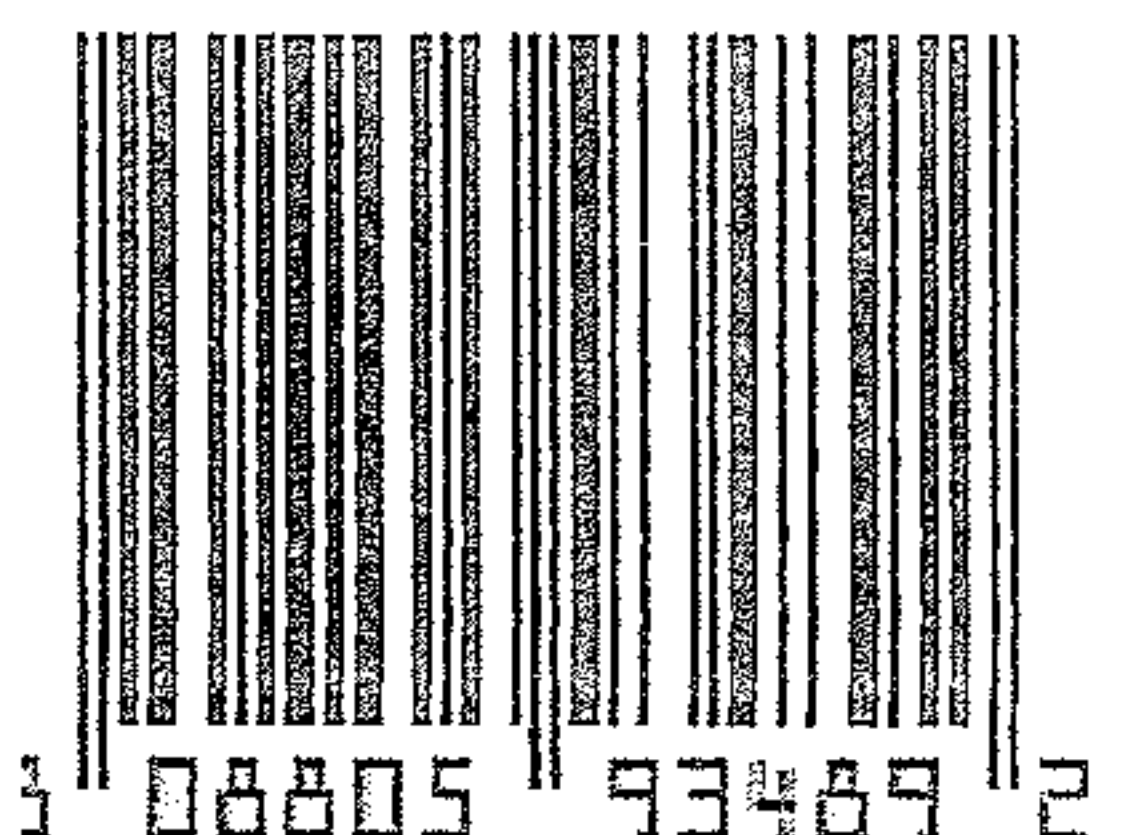

Tommy Barron, 22, Ingleside Ave Athens, was charged with DUI. Officer Green LCPD, was dispatched to a possible wreck with injury at Hwy 321 and Hwy 11. Officer arrived on scene and observed a blue vehicle that had crashed into a concrete barrier on the

Barron to perform sobriety test which he agreed and stated he would fail. Barron performed poorly on sobriety. Tommy Barron was placed under arrest and transported to the Loudon County Jail.

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
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Trash

Timothy Carpenter, 36, Industrial Park Drive Lenoir City, was charged with Mfg/Sell/Poss. Of Controlled Substance. Inv. J. Ketner, observed the driver of a Toyota vehicle not wearing a seatbelt in the Grove Street area, and the passenger threw a piece of trash out the window. Deputy stopped the vehicle and identified the driv-

er and the passenger as Timothy Carpenter. While speaking with the driver Carpenter appeared to be stuffing something in the back of his pants. Deputy ask everyone to step out of the vehicle. Sgt. Newman LPD arrived and located a needle cap on Carpenters person, and stated he had a hyperemic needle in the backseat. The owner of the vehicle gave consent to search the vehicle, one needle was located under

the floorboard carpet in the back seat. 10 Gabeapentin wrapped in cellophane was located stuffed in between the seat where Carpenter was sitting. Carpenter stated it was his and did not have a prescription for the medication at the time of arrest.

2. Let wildlife stay wild – Some animals might seem like they need help, but they don't need rescuing. Babies of some species are left alone all day and

rely on camouflage for protection. If you do happen upon a truly injured animal, there is a list of wildlife rehabilitators at TNwildlife.org.

3. Avoid feeding wildlife - Feeding wildlife can lead to serious problems. Human food is not healthy for wild animals and they do not need it to survive. Wild animals have specialized diets and can become malnourished or die if fed the wrong foods. Also, animals cannot distinguish food from wrappers or foil and can get sick eating these items.

4. Don't litter - Most people know litter is bad for the planet, but also bad for unsuspecting wildlife. Everyday items such as

drink cans and plastic bottles can be deadly for animals, even dogs and cats. Animals of all kinds often mistake trash for food or shelter. Harm to animals can be avoided if litter is disposed properly.

5. Turn your yard into good habitat - Creating habitat in your home's yard is beneficial to wildlife. Habitat is a combination of food, water, shelter, and space arranged to meet the needs of wildlife. Even a small yard can be landscaped to attract birds, butterflies, beneficial insects,

and small animals. Trees, shrubs, and other plants provide shelter and food for wildlife.

6. Appreciate the biodiversity of Tennessee! - We are blessed in Tennessee with lots of wildlife to see. From more than 300 bird species to the 320 different types of fish, we are the salamander capital of the world (56 different kinds), and 22 different frogs and toads. Get outside and look and listen for all of these Tennessee residents! The TWRA is a diverse operation. From hunting, fishing, and boating, to protecting non-game species and creating watchable wildlife opportunities, the TWRA serves the citizens of Tennessee. The Loudon County Commission will hold a public hearing at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, August 5, 2019 in the boardroom of the Loudon County Courthouse Annex, 101 Mulberry St., Loudon, to receive public comments regarding amending the Zoning Map of Loudon County, TN to rezone Parcel 046.00 & 047.00, Loudon County Tax Map 084, located at 7409 and 7417 Hwy. 411S, Greenback, TN, in the 3rd Legislative District from C-2, General Commercial District to C-1, Rural Center District, approximately 1.08 acres.

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DUI

Abiel Matias, 38, C Street Lenoir City, was charged with DUI, and Driving on Revoked/Suspended License. Officer Green LCPD, observed a silver vehicle traveling on Harrison Road. Officer observed the vehicle swerve several times nearly driving off the road. Officer initiated a traffic stop on Browder Hollow Road @ Foster Road, vehicle failed to stop until it arrived at an address on Foster Road. Officer order the driver out of the vehicle and detained him. While Officer was escorting the driver identified as Abiel Matias to his patrol vehicle Officer could smell a strong odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from his person. Matias stated he had consumed a few Michelob's but did not know they were alcoholic beverages. A check through dispatch revealed Matias license were revoked out of Loudon County for DUI. Matias did poorly on sobriety test and was placed under arrest.

Casey Hannah Howren sentenced to serve 14 years in prison for conspiring to distribute methamphetamine. Howren admitted to distributing between 1.5 and 4.5 kilograms of Methamphetamine, primarily in Greene and Washington

Casey Hannah Howren, 27, of Elizabethton, Tennessee, was sentenced on July 8, 2019, by the Honorable J. Ronnie Greer, Senior U.S. District Court Judge, to serve 14 years in federal prison. Federal sentences cannot be considered for parole.

Howren pleaded guilty in December 2018 for conspiring with Pedro Cortez Gomez and Kayla Leanne Reaves to distribute over 50 grams of methamphetamine.

Pedro Cortez-Gomez, 36, of Greenville, Tennessee, a citizen of Mexico, was sentenced on April 29, 2019, by

Judge Greer to serve 15 years in federal prison.

Kayla Leanne Reaves, 25, of Afton, Tennessee, was sentenced by Judge Greer on April 22, 2019, to serve 41 months in prison.

Agencies involved in this investigation included the Third Judicial District Drug Task Force, Greene County Sheriff's Department, Carter County Sheriff's Department, Johnson City Police Department, FBI, ATF and DEA. J. Christian Lampe and Robert M. Reeves, Assistant U.S. Attorneys, represented the United States in court proceedings. This case was a result of the Department of Justice's Organized Crime and Drug Enforcement Task Force (OCDETF) program, the centerpiece of the Department of Justice's drug supply reduction strategy. OCDETF was established in 1982 to conduct comprehensive, multi-level attacks on major drug traf-

ficking and money laundering organizations. Today, OCDETF combines the resources and expertise of its member federal agencies in cooperation with state and local law enforcement. The principal mission of

the OCDETF program is to identify, disrupt, and dismantle the most serious drug trafficking and money laundering organizations and those primarily responsible for the nation's drug supply.
