Kaitlyn Mills, 21, Sheandoah Drive Friendsville, was charged with Theft of Property, and Mfg/Del/Sale or Poss. of Meth. Officer R. Miller LCPD, observed three subjects walk to a black vehicle that was parked out in front of Walmart while conducting his nightly business checks. Robert Wilson, 58, Cedar Lane Georgia, was charged with DUI, Financial Responsibility, and Speeding 21 mph over the Limit. Deputy Lance Anderson LCSO, observed a silver vehicle displaying a GA. Tag swerving in the right lane, and paced the vehicle at 79 mph in a 65 mph speed zone. Upon traffic stop Deputy identified the driver as James Wilson. Deputy observed an odor of an alcoholic beverage emitting from his person, Wilson stated he consumed 2 vodka shot two hours prior to stop. Wilson also produced a bottle of oxycodone from his left pocket that was filled on 9/1/19 for a qty of 60. The bottle only contained 36.5 pills. Wilson did poorly on HGN sobriety test, and stated he could not do the walk and turn due to an previous injury. During a search of the vehicle.Deputy located a small emp-

ty bottle of peach vodka under the driver seat. A check of Wilson's GA>, driving history revealed

he had DUI conviction in 1991, 1993, 1998, 2006, and 2011. Robert Wilson was placed under arrest.


