



Obaidullah Wahab33. Foxvue Road Knoxville, was charged with, TRES-PASS ON OR INJURY TO CEMETERY PROPERTY INTERFERENCE WITH PROCESSIONS OR RELI-GIOUS EXERCISES, and LEAVING THE SCENE OF ACCIDENT PROPERTY DAMAGE.

Deputy Harrison LCSO. was notified of an abandoned vehicle in the Lakeview Cemetery, that was wrecked over top of a burial site set for a service on the following day. Once on scene, The deputy observed a blue Honda that appeared to have been purposefully wrecked onto a Muslim grave site. The registration on the vehicle came back to Obaidullah Wahab, an Afghani refugee who has been causing issues with the local Muslim community that resulted in a restraining odor being put in place in Knox County. Approximately one month prior, owners of the cemetery were actively digging another site and the subject showed up, got into the grave, and proceeded to lay on his back stating "Is this my grave?". The deputy was able to make contact the Admin for The Muslim Community of Knoxville. She

stated Wahab was picked up outside Lakeview Cemetery earlier this day by his friends. While Wahab was speaking with them he stated he had provide any more informaappeared to have been ripped off during the crash from the deputy was able to locate the bumper in the trunk of the vehicle. Knox County Sheriff's Office attempted to make contact with Wahab at the address associated with the vehicle registration and mail but it is no longer occupied. Based on the facts above, and due to the proximity of the burial site to the roadway inside the cemetery, it is apparent the vehicle was intentionally wrecked over the grave site and left there abandoned afterward. This did occur in Loudon County, Tennessee.



Ronald Cochran, 60, Pine Grove Road Loudon, was charged with, DUI x2, Simple Possession x2, Driving Unregistered Vehicle, Use of Safety Belt, and Financial Responsibility.

Officer A. Luna LPD, received a call for a welfare check at Grove St. at The Local Market. The officer was advised there was a male asleep at the wheel at pump number three. The officer made contact with Mr. Ronald Cochran who was asleep at the wheel of his vehicle. The employee advised he had not come inside and purchased anything. plead guilty to count one of an indictment charging him with use of a minor to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing a visual depiction of such conduct in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 2251(a).

According to the written plea agreement filed with the court, McAneny began an online relationship with a 12-year-old girl. On February 4, 2024, McAneny traveled from his home in Grainger County, Tennessee to pick up the minor from her home in Hamblen County, Tennessee. She did not have permission to leave her home. Her family reported her missing the same day. From February 4 to February 6, 2024, while at McAneny's home he took photos, and video recorded the minor and himself engaged in sex-

ual acts. McAneny sent a sentencing. video of the minor victim engaged in sexual acts with him to a third party online. The person contacted law enforcement upon receipt of the video. Based on the call law enforcement was able to locate the 12-year-old girl at McAneny's home.

U.S. Attorney Francis M. Hamilton III, of the Eastern District of Tennessee, and Special Agent in Charge Joe Carrico, of the FBI Nashville Field Office, made the announcement.


