ALTERCATION BETWEEN NEIGHBORS TURNS DEADLY, SHOOTING UNDER INVESTIGATION

An altercation between two men turned deadly early Thursday afternoon in Southern Loudon County.

Sheriff Tim Guider announced that at around 1:54 pm Thursday afternoon, a 911 call came in to the Loudon County 911 Center from a male identified as Tony James, stating that an-

other male had been shot. Deputies and EMS arrived on scene in the 8000 block of Pond Creek Road and found a male, later identified as 84 year old Robert Blanton, deceased from what appeared to be gunshot wounds.

62 year old Tony James, was detained on scene by deputies.

He was transported to the Loudon County Sheriff's Office Criminal Investigations Division and interviewed to determine his involvement in the shooting.

"This is a tragic and senseless outcome to a very avoidable situation and our detectives are working diligently to examine all of the evidence available see Shooting pg. 2

DUI Charge Follows Traffic Stop

Amanda Lane, 37, Seymour Lane Knoxville, was charged with DUI, and Violation of Implied Consent.

Deputy Eric Curtis LCSO, responded to a traffic stop by Sgt. M Fagiana 949. Upon arrival, Deputy made contact with the driver of a Honda CR-V, Amanda Lane. The driver was slow to answer my questions, disoriented, and stated that she had been drinking earlier at the

Tiki Hut in Lenoir City. Deputy asked the driver to conduct Standardized Field Sobriety Tests, and her performance indicated that she was impaired. An opened bottle of Jack Daniels Tennessee Fire was found in her purse. Deputy placed Amanda Lane under arrest for driving under the influence and read her the Implied Consent Advisement Form, and she refused to provide a sample.

CDC Investigation Notice: CDC Warns of Salmonella Infections Linked to Recalled Raw Frozen Breaded Stuffed Chicken

A CDC food safety alert regarding a multistate outbreak of Salmonella Enteritidis infections has been posted: <https://www.cdc.gov/salmonella/enteritidis-06-21/index.html>

Key points:

Twenty-eight people infected with the outbreak strain of Salmonella Enteritidis

have been reported from eight states. Eleven people were hospitalized, and no deaths have been reported.

Interviews with ill people, traceback information, and product testing results show that frozen, raw chicken products that are breaded, pre-browned, and stuffed

are the likely source of this outbreak.

On August 9, Serenade Foods recalled external icon approximately 59,251 pounds of frozen raw breaded stuffed chicken products that bear establishment number "P-2375" inside the USDA mark of inspection.

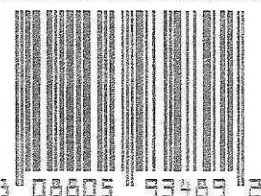

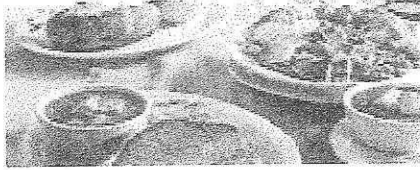
review. This is a very active investigation and no charges have been filed at this time." said Guider.

Knox County Public Library to receive a major influx of funds for library materials

Knox County Public Library is pleased to announce a significant increase in the state's appropriation for support of Tennessee's four metro libraries. Governor Bill Lee recommended \$1.5 million in recurring funds, and another \$1.5 million in single-year funds to be used for the purchase of library materials. The Legislature approved the appropriation, effective July 1. The funds will be divided between Chattanooga, Knoxville, Memphis, and Metro Nashville library systems on a per capita basis. For Knox County Public Library, the appropriation will provide an increase of \$654,600 for a total of \$706,500 from the state in Fiscal Year 2022.

The Library will use the funds to purchase books in all formats – print, ebook, audiobook on CD, and downloadable audiobooks for adult, teen, and juvenile titles. This expenditure will reduce hold times for popular items and will add items in every category.

Downloadable audiobooks and ebooks are some of the most popular collections in the Library with circulation rates increasing 8 percent and 12 percent respectively in 2020-21. The cost of one downloadable audiobook ranges from \$50 to \$110. For ebooks, the cost range is \$27 to \$60.

"We are very pleased to have this financial support from the state. This allocation comes at an important time as library usage continues to increase, particularly in the online category," commented Myretta Black, Senior Director of the Library. "The online materials are the most expensive items in our collection and continue to be a great way for the Library to provide access to our resources."

In spite of COVID, no indoor programming, and many restrictions in place, the library circulation rate increased 9.2 percent over FY2020 with a total circulation of 2.7 million items.

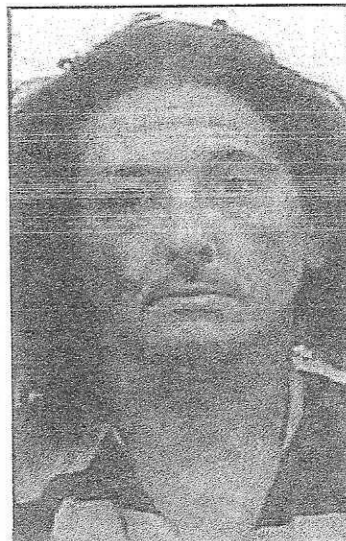
Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs has long advocated reading throughout the community and helped start READ CITY USA. "We are grateful to Governor Lee and our state legislators for this significant increase in the budget for the metro libraries. Our libraries are well-used and provide a very important service to our community as we work to create brighter futures for our children," said Mayor Jacobs. "Learning to read and having access to high quality materials is fundamental to our focus on literacy and education. The libraries are also a critical place for job seekers and adult learners to be able to better their lives."

James Brown, 37, Eagle Ridge Road Sweetwater, was charged with Mfg/De4l/Sale or Poss. Of Meth, Tampering/ Fabricating with Evidence, and Resisting Arrest.

Deputy activated his emergency siren and the vehicle failed to stop. Deputy pursued the vehicle for over 30 minutes to 411 near Monroe County where Deputies used spike strips to effectively deflate the vehicle's tires. Deputy initiated the box-in maneuver, as the driver violently attempted to ram this Deputy's vehicle. The truck became disabled after running partially off the roadway. Once stationary, Deputy did observe both occupants in the vehicle tossing multiple small baggies in their mouth. The driver, Ms. Hannah Fitzgerald-Nelson began having an active seizure as she was placed in custody. Before contact with Deputies, the passenger Mr. James Brown, exited the vehicle while attempting to swallow a small baggie. Mr. Brown was taken to the ground and refused to place his hands behind his back. After placing Mr. Brown in cuffs a small bag of crystal meth 0.5 grams, was found near his person.

While questioning Mr. Brown, he stated both parties had attempted to swallow meth to prevent being charged. Ms. Hannah was unable to attempt SFST and refused to consent to a blood draw upon being read Tn Implied Consent. also stated to a Monroe County Deputy that she intentionally drove at him, while he attempted to use his spike-strip, in hopes he would shoot her. Both offender's were taken to the Fort Loudoun Medical Center where they were cleared and then to the Loudon County Jail. Ms. Hannah was charged with Evading, Tampering with Evidence, DUI and was cited for Driving on Suspended License, Implied Consent, and Failing to Maintain Lane. Mr. Brown was charged with Possession of Meth, Tampering with Evidence and Resisting Arrest.
