

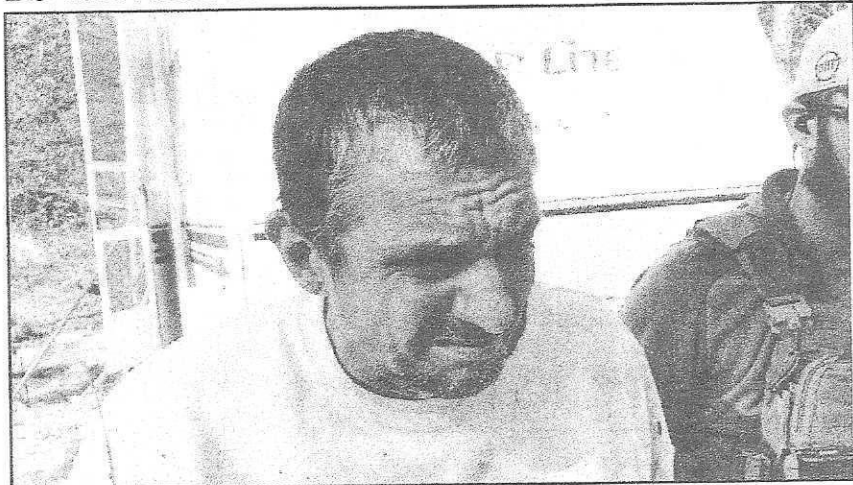

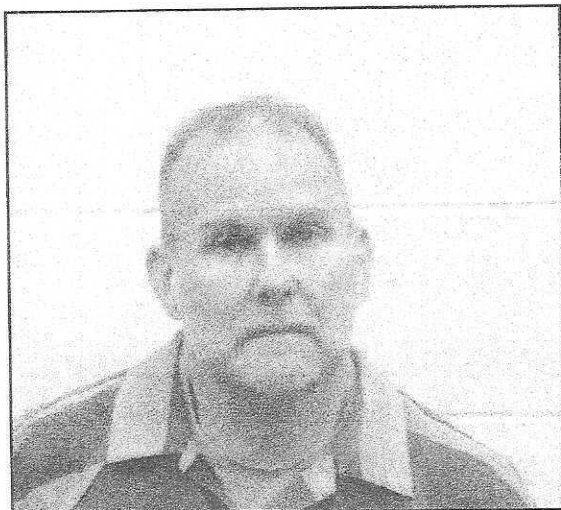

Biden-Harris Administration Agencies Sign Inter-agency Agreement to Address Wildfire Risk and Protect Communities from Smoke

Environmental Protection Agency Administrator Michael S. Regan, Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack and Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Mandy Cohen announced a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to further their joint work to protect communities from the im-

pacts of wildfire smoke, while promoting land management practices that reduce the risk of large, severe fires. The four agencies – the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), the U.S. Department of the Interior (DOI), and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) – also released a joint plan outlining wildland fire-related

priorities the agencies will focus on over the next two years.

“From coast to coast, the nation is facing a growing threat of wildfire induced by climate change, including from the smoke that can harm people hundreds of miles away,” said EPA Administrator Michael S. Regan. “We can have a bigger

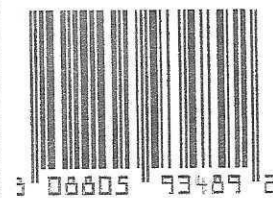

Upon contact by law enforcement officers, Burch was found with Richard Dixon. Dixon

had previously been contacted by U.S. Marshall's officers and told Burch had felony warrants for his arrest and to come forward with any information about Burch's location or face criminal prosecution. At the time of contact it was discovered Dixon had known of Burch's location the entire time and had given him a vehicle, white panel van TN 681H185, to use in the continued escape from Loudon County Sheriff's department.

Jason Rogers, 49, Taft Packet Road Lenoir City, was charged with Aggravated Assault Reckless Driving, Leaving the Scene of Accident, and Driving on Revoked/Suspended License.

Officers with the Lenoir City Police Dept. responded to the Petro's Restaurant in regard to a wreck with injury. Upon arrival, Officer Eldridge located the victim laying on the ground crying with an apparent lower extremity injury. She told officers that a male driver, later identified as (Jason Rogers) side swiped her vehicle on Hwy 321 and continued driving. Victim followed the vehicle to the Petro's and confronted the male about hitting her vehicle. She stated that Jason attempted to drive off while she was at his driver side window resulting in her being dragged by his vehicle, falling to the ground and having her leg ran over in the process. She told officers that he had dropped off a female at Petro and officers made contact with the female who was his Niece and did confirm that her uncle did hit the vehicle on Hwy 321 and did not stop. She advised that her uncle lived at Shaw Ferry Rd, and Officers did locate Jason at this residence and place him in custody. Jason told offi-

cers that he doesn't remember hitting a vehicle and if he ran over the victim in the parking lot he did not notice it. Officers relocated Jason back to Petros to review camera footage which did show the victim attempt to stop Jason from leaving the scene as he drove away in a reckless manner. An employee on scene stated that she witnessed the whole thing and did see the victim being drug and eventually getting ran over. Both witnesses gave written statements to officers on the incident. The victim was transported via EMS to Fort Loudon Medical Center and Jason was transported to the Loudon Co Jail. Dispatch also advised that Jason did have a suspended drivers license. This incident did occur in Lenoir City, Loudon Co, TN.

Guilty

Bradley Posey (24 years old) was convicted today of three counts of especially aggravated sexual exploitation of a minor for the production of child pornography at Posey's residence during January of 2023.

A joint investigation was conducted with Ninth Judicial District Internet Crimes Against Children Agent (ICAC) Cortney Dugger, and Roane County Sheriff's Office Detective Randy Heidle. Dugger and Heidle along with DAG Investigator Chanel Finnell, seized electronics belonging to Posey. During the forensic examination, investigators located numerous photos and video of child pornography and evidence that Posey produced child pornography at his home.

When Posey was interviewed by investigators, he admitted to producing images and videos

of three prepubescent minors in the bathroom of his home.

Posey waived his right to a preliminary hearing on November 7, 2023, and entered a guilty plea before the Honorable Jeffrey Wicks to three counts of especially aggravated sexual exploitation of a minor. He was sentenced to 26 years in the custody of the Tennessee Department of Corrections to be served at 100% with no early release eligibility.

Posey was represented by Assistant Public Defender Joe Norris.

The case was prosecuted on behalf of District Attorney General Russell Johnson's Office by ADA Jason Coliver.

General Johnson thanks ICAC Agent Cortney Dugger, DAG's Investigator Chanel Finnell, and RCSO Detective Randy Heidle for their dedication to the protection of children in our community.

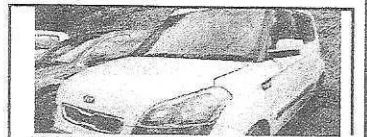

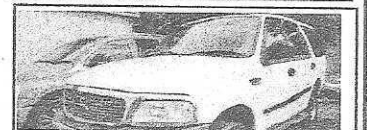

impact on protecting people by partnering across the Biden-Harris Administration. "With today's interagency agreement we commit to urgent action to reduce the risk of severe wildfires and dangerous smoke."

"This year has shown the entire country and the world that wildfires don't stop at a state or country line – they impact all of us and require a coordinated and collaborative approach," said Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland. "The Biden-Harris administration is committed to using every tool available to protect communities from the hazards of wildfire smoke, while also ensuring we have the tools we need to reduce the future risk of large, high severity wildfire events."

"Since fires and smoke don't recognize borders or jurisdictions, neither should we, and this agreement will help agen-

cies under the Biden-Harris Administration better protect the people and communities we serve," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack.

"The increasing frequency and magnitude of wildfires pose an ever-growing threat to the health of the American public," said Mandy Cohen, M.D., M.P.H., Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. "This MOU demonstrates the U.S. government's commitment to mitigating the negative health consequences from wildfire smoke and is a pledge to protect health by reducing the risk of future, large-scale wildfires."

The MOU outlines how the agencies are working together to advance public health preparedness, minimize smoke impacts to the public and ensure regulatory pathways under the Clean Air Act accommodate greater use of prescribed fire. Under the MOU, the four

agencies commit to coordinating the implementation of policies, communications, and programs that relate to the use of prescribed fire to benefit restoration of forests and other wildlands, and protect communities. The agencies will work together to reduce the negative health impacts of smoke on human health and community well-being.

The joint workplan outlines areas of focus for the agencies' partnership for fiscal years 2024 and 2025:

- community preparedness; ensuring that land management and public health goals are addressed together;
- data collection and sharing; and

interagency communication and messaging.

The MOU and workplan follow the recent Wildland Fire Mitigation and Management Commission Report to Congress, which urged an "all of the above" approach – at all levels

of society – to address the impacts of wildfires on communities across the country. While many of the Commission's recommendations focus on actions Congress must take, this MOU represents a major step forward to the report's vision of greater coordination and collaboration among agencies working on wildfire.

This work complements the historic investments from President Biden's Investing in America agenda to increase the resilience of lands facing the threat of wildland fires and to better support federal wildland firefighters. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law includes \$1.5 billion for the Department of the Interior and \$3 billion for the USDA to invest in preparedness, fuels management, post-fire restoration, and fire science – all of which will help strengthen long-term fire preparedness, reduce fire risk across states, and invest in our wildland firefighter workforce.
